Lawrence Sanford Tate

October 9, 1915 - September 12, 1991

Lawrence Sanford Tate, age 75, of El Campo, passed away Thursday, September 12, 1991, at approximately 4:30 a.m. at his residence following a brave three-year struggle with cancer.

Born October 9, 1915, in Ft. Gibson, Oklahoma to James Matthews Tate and Charlotte "Lottie" Durham Tate, he lived in this area most of his life.

A veteran of WWII, he served with the U.S. Navy as a Motor Machinist's Mate with the 124th Naval Construction Battalion (CBs). Following the war on April 11, 1948, he and Willie Maye were united in marriage in Eagle Lake. He was involved in the Farm Implement business in Eagle Lake and later enlarged and moved the business to El Campo in 1966.

Soon after moving to El Campo, he let his hobby of clock and watch collecting become his career. He had been a member of the N.A.W.C.C. (National Association of Watch Clock Collectors) since 1969. He was Director and Past President of Chapter 15, NAWCC and a Charter Member of Chapter 139 NAWCC.

Civically, Mr. Tate always showed a deep concern for his community and its youth. He was an Honorary Life Member and former Asst. Chief with the Eagle Lake Volunteer Fire Dept., serving 22 years. He worked with the Eagle Lake Boy Scouts, served as Cubmaster for almost 10 years, and was active with Little League.

He was active in the Eagle Lake Retail Merchants Assn. and later Director and Past President of the Eagle Lake Chamber of Commerce. During his tenure as Chamber President, he headed the FM 3013 project, connecting Eagle Lake and Sealy, securing right-of-ways in order that this highway project might succeed; and it did. In El Campo, he was a strong supporter of the Youth Fair, 100 Club and Merchant Associations.

He was preceded in death by his parents and a brother, Douglas M. Tate.

Survivors include his devoted wife of 43 years, Willie Maye Tate of El Campo; sons, Lawrence J. Tate and Paul S. Tate, both of Dallas and William J. Reading of Austin; brother and sister-in-law, Ed and Stella Tate of Eagle Lake; a number of nieces, nephews and a host of loved ones.

Administrator's news: Many older adults who have learned to walk again after suffering a broken hip or regained the use of their hands following a stroke attribute a great deal of their recovery to a physical rehabilitation professional. That's why Heritage House will join health care providers across the nation as they honor physical rehabilitation professionals during Rehabilitation Week, September 15-21.

Physical rehabilitation has always played a critical role in the

continuum of care provided to residents at Heritage House.

Therapists and therapy aides are part of a comprehensive, multi-disciplinary health care team. Physical rehabilitation in the long-term care setting provides a much needed health option for those recovering from conditions like stroke and broken hips.

There are several distinctions among physical, speech, and occupational therapy. In general, physical therapy helps to relieve pain, to improve or restore ability to walk and to improve overall strength, flexibility, coordination, and mobility. Speech therapy helps to improve verbal and non-verbal means of communication, reading and writing skills, and comprehension of questions. Occupational therapy helps to improve the patient's management of activities of daily living, including dressing, grooming and feeding.

Some of the residents at Heritage House are at a fragile, subsacute level and they need different types of physical therapy programs, which is why they benefit so much from the physical, speech and occupational therapy that our rehabilitation team offers.

W.I.C. clinics open around county

The Women, Infants and Children's Program (W.I.C.) administered by the Texas Dept. of Health is designed for women who are breast feeding, pregnant or post-partum, infants, and children 5 and under. It provides nutrition education and foods such as formula, cheese, milk, beans, peanut butter and eggs.
