Match-up signals how partisan '92 elections should be

One of Gov. Ann Richards' elite appointees drew an election opponent last week, a former energy advisor to President George Bush.

The match-up, pitting insider against insider, signals how partisan the '92 elections should be, as Republicans seek to regain turf lost by the foot-in-the-mouth gubernatorial race of Clayton Williams.

Barry Williamson, a Dallas Republican, announced he is a candidate for the Texas Railroad Commission

seat now held by Lena Guerrero, a former state representative from Austin.

The governor named Guerrero to the post a few months ago, apparently to reward her as top campaign advisor, because she had no energy industry experience.

Shortly after her appointment, Guerrero underscored her OJT (on-the-job training) status by asking independent oilmen to bear with her while she learned the business.

Inexperience Targeted
Williamson targeted her inexperience last week when he said, "I'm the only candidate who will be in the energy business after the election; a

commissioner if he wins, an oilman if he loses."

Williamson called for a national energy policy, and Guerrero echoed by promising her staff will develop one in the coming months.

Williamson is a son-in-law of prominent Midland oilman Bobby Holt and former director of the Office of Mineral Management in the U.S. Department of Interior.

Another Republican, former Austin mayor Carole Keeton Rylander, is expected to join the race. Her candidacy would particularly hurt

Bullock sets record straight on new bingo tax

Dear Editor:

When the commercial bingo hall operators complain about new state taxes on bingo, they should also admit how much the Legislature gave them.

For one thing, the original commercial bingo hall rental tax proposal was 10% but that was cut to 3%.

Also, the Legislature gave the commercial operators — but not the charity games — the right to sell lottery tickets for a profit if and when Texas gets a lottery. There is no telling how many millions of dollars commercial operators will make from that.

These big commercial operators have taken the lead in blaming me personally for the new bingo taxes and I would like to set the record straight. The responsibility for writing a realistic

tax bill landed in the Senate's lap when the House of Representatives passed only a shell of a bill that totally failed to even come close to financing state government for 1992-93.

At that point, I, along with the Speaker of the House, chairman of the Senate Finance and House Ways and Means Committees and staff members, met and reviewed a list of possible sources of revenue to close the gap.

The list was prepared by staff from the Senate, House and previous lists prepared by the State Comptroller.

The final list was prepared with the thought in mind of what the House would accept. A bingo tax was just one of the agreed upon items.

The list was widely distributed, reported in the press and a hearing was held in the Senate. Only two people in the bingo industry gave brief testimony and not one of the registered lobbyists for the industry testified.

The tax bill containing the bingo tax was passed by a two-thirds vote of both the House and Senate and signed by the Governor. It enabled state services to continue after September 1, unlike some other states where state services actually came to a halt.

I do not know anyone involved in the process that is proud of the new tax bill, but it is time that those in the bingo industry offer solutions and honesty instead of complaints.

U.S. Congressman Greg Laughlin ... Calls for 'Year of the Gulf'

Calling it a "national treasure for all Americans," U.S. Congressman Greg Laughlin (D-W. Columbia) introduced legislation last week that would designate 1992 as the "Year of the Gulf."

"I hope my legislation raises the awareness of all Americans on the need to preserve the Gulf of Mexico," said Laughlin, Chairman of the Sunbelt Caucus' Gulf of Mexico Task Force. "I grew up along the Gulf of Mexico and throughout my life have come to appreciate it for its many values, but the Gulf's resources benefit people far beyond its borders."

The Gulf of Mexico produces 40% of the nation's seafood and 90% of U.S. offshore oil and gas. Revenues from outer continental shelf oil and gas leases alone rank second only to the federal income tax as a revenue source for the U.S. Treasury. In addition, Gulf ports handle 45% of U.S. import-export shipping tonnage.

"Unfortunately, many people do not realize that activities all over the country have adverse environmental impacts on the Gulf of Mexico," said Laughlin. "Two-thirds of the continental U.S. drains into the Gulf."

The Gulf's estuaries, wetlands and barrier islands provide critical habitat for large populations of finfish, shellfish, waterfowl, shorebirds, colonial nesting birds, and 75% of the migratory waterfowl traversing the U.S.

During the past few decades the Gulf has begun to show signs of decreasing environmental quality which threatens the wildlife and commercial viability of Gulf fisheries. Excess nutrients, toxic substances and pesticide contamination, and human pathogens are all contributing to the environmental degradation of the Gulf.

Emphasizing the national importance of the Gulf, Laughlin said, "It is clearly in the best interest of all Americans to preserve and enhance the natural and economic resources of the Gulf of Mexico."

Laughlin's resolution calls on all federal and state agencies which have responsibility for matters affecting the Gulf of Mexico to take an active role in increasing the public's awareness of the value of the Gulf and of the current conditions which threaten it.

GUARD AGAINST BRUXISM
BRUXISM is the constant clenching or grinding and grinding of teeth. It is a nervous habit that can do a significant amount of damage to teeth and jaw if continued over a significant period of time.
One way to reduce the destructive effects of bruxism is by using a special flat surfaced night guard. This is a device which can be custom made for you by a dentist or periodontist. The night guard will not solve the problem, but patients will be biting on a flat plane instead of the inclined planes of the teeth. It may relieve the chronic headache from constant pressure typical in such cases. It will also slow down some of the wear of the teeth and supporting structures.
The guard is usually constructed to fit over the upper jaw, but in special cases it can be made for a lower jaw (only the posterior teeth). Your dentist can evaluate your case and decide which is advisable.
