Raider JV team defeats Tidehaven 16-14

Charlyan Thomas scored twice and David Godley ran for 79 yards and two 2-point conversions to lead the Raiders to a 16-14 victory over Tidehaven here last Thursday night.

Thomas returned a first quarter punt 46 yards for the first Raider score

and Godley ran for the 2-point conversion to stake Rice to an early 8-0 lead. Tidehaven scored late in the second quarter to even the score at 8-8.

The Raiders opened the second half by marching 64 yards to break the deadlock and take a 16-8 lead. The

drive was highlighted by two 12-yard runs by Godley and Charles Chapman; and Thomas' 32-yard touchdown run on 3rd and 6. Godley ran for the two-point conversion.

Offensively, the Raiders were led by the blocking of Gabe Garza, Sam

Mader, B.J. Dupre, Greg Garcia, Louis Mahalic and Justin Kutzer. Defensive standouts for the Raiders were Chapman, Trinity Parker and Greg Garcia who had three quarterback sacks.

This win improved the JV Raiders' record to 2-1. The team will play in Edna at 6 p.m. this Thursday.

The Texas A&I defensive unit spent lots of time on the field in their game against Southwest Texas. Brian Brinkley, 5-10, 180-pound junior from Van Vleet, took advantage of the playing time. He was one of

several statistical standouts for the Javelinas, figuring in four different categories. Johnell Dogins, 6-1, 210-pound junior from Rice High School, was the leading tackler from his linebacking position. He had 13, seven unassisted. Brinkley had 10 tackles from his secondary position including seven interception of the season and was

credited with breaking up two more of the SWT tosses. Two of his tackles were in the SWT backfield.

Just as in the opening game against Nicholls State, the Javelina defense had several stands inside the 20. It halted the Bobcats twice inside the 15. One of the SWT drives ended at the 11 with a missed field goal and the other saw them reaching the two before turning over the ball on a fumble.

Tidehaven Tigers whip Rice 41-6

The Rice Raiders improved their play this week by using a great effort during the first quarter and a half of the first half. The Raiders held the Tigers scoreless for 22 minutes in the first half. The Raiders offense took the opening drive 29 yards and ran 25 yards for the score. The P.A.T. was no good as Donner ran for two yards.

With the score now 21-6, the game proceeded to get out of hand as the Raiders began to score with ease through the air on their next two scores. "We had many let downs after we scored our only touchdown. This is the area we need to improve the most," insisted Coach Johnson. "We must fight back when our backs are to the wall," commented Coach Johnson.

Coach Johnson spoke of the play of Melvin Anderson, Kevin Jackson, Reggie Donner, Truman Scott, Marcus Dogins, Donald Adams and Gonzalo de la Garza and Darian Barrow will be lost for sure during the next one or two games. De la Garza has an injured left knee and Barrow has an injured left ankle. "We cannot afford any more injuries. It hurt our team tremendously when de la Garza went down. He was playing an outstanding game on defense and offense," commented Coach Johnson.

On defense, Adams, Jackson and Anderson collected seven tackles each. Melvin Anderson was named the defensive player of the week. Reggie Donner was the offensive player of the week with a 113-yard effort rushing. The offensive lineman of the week is Larry Garcia. Larry graded out at 54% for the game.

Friday the Raiders will host the 3-0 Cowboys from Edna. Edna will bring a talented team of skilled players at quarterback, running back, receiver, defensive back and linebacker. Their line is very big; averaging over 200 lbs. each," commented Coach Johnson. On offense, look for the Cowboys to run outside and pass deep to their skilled receivers. On defense, look for them to swarm to the ball carrier to make tackles. "Their defense likes to gang tackle. They seem to all have a nose for the ball especially Mack Robinson and Shawn Lippe (the inside linebackers)," said Johnson. Game time is 8 p.m.

FRESHMEN TEAM CANCELLED
"We have cancelled our freshmen schedule and combined it with our

remaining JV team. This was a move out of necessity due to the low numbers on the varsity after the many injuries suffered the past two games," commented Johnson. Johnson added, "There is no way to play seven players on JV. We were playing the JV with eleven players. This was not working due to the players' physical shape and the level of play of our opponent."

This season we have had a low number of players participate and this fact is a problem that everyone can help by encouraging our sons and daughters to stick out the tough moments. The second problem is the physical conditioning of our players. They are endangering themselves if they do not work out during the summer. We, as parents and athletic boosters, should encourage our sons and daughters to work out and use our school facilities during the months of May through August.

"Yes, of course, these are things I need the communities' support on. More importantly, our athletes need the strength and stamina with which to compete. This subject only causes our athletes to experience bad moments leading to the decision to quit a sport in a weak moment," added Johnson.

CPAIS announces Colorado County representatives

Coastal Plains Agri-Business Incubator System, Inc. (CPAIS) "the incubator without walls", has announced four Colorado County representatives have been added to the 7-county regional advisory committee.

Carl Foshee, chairman, announced the CPAIS board has appointed County Judge H. O. "Butch" Strunk; businessman Jay Vack; Home Extension Agent Peggy Braden; and the new Economic Development Coordinator Loyd Smith to serve as the local contacts for innovative entrepreneurs in the Colorado County area. Chairman Foshee stated "It is exciting to have these individuals join us in our efforts to diversify the regional economy! We appreciate their advice and support."

CPAIS is a volunteer organization serving Wharton, Matagorda, Calhoun, Colorado, DeWitt, Lavaca and Jackson counties. It is a 501(c)3 non-profit corporation whose mission is to help entrepreneurs develop their dreams or existing businesses in the fields of agriculture, aquaculture, or small business endeavor. It has also developed into a resource network.

Since December 1988, the CPAIS has worked closely with the Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas A&M University, University of Texas, Texas Tech University, area agriculture and marine extension agents, Wharton County Electric Cooperative, Wharton County Junior College, University of Houston-Victoria, El Campo Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture and other area economic development entities. Created as the first "ag incubator" in Texas, the CPAIS has become a role model for others around the state and nation.

Recently, the NRECA (National Rural Electric Cooperative Association) sent reporters and video film crew to El Campo. An article on the LITS Gator Farm appeared in the May 1991 issue of the national RE Magazine. In July 1991, a video crew from Washington, D.C. created footage of some of the projects assisted by the CPAIS. It will become one of a series of videos created by the NRECA to help economic development groups around the nation start their own local efforts.

Projects assisted have included farmers growing or raising alligators, dwarf apples, wine and table grapes, bullfrogs, kiwi fruit, figs, ostriches, emus, ches, exotic birds, bluegill humpback catfish, crawfish, shiitake mushrooms, jumbo white pheasants, flying pheasants, organic rice and caged channel catfish.

The CPAIS has assisted regional small business entrepreneurs by offering free professional advice from their board of area experts. Initially, grants were offered to those who had ideas in which they had already invested time and effort. During 1989 and 1990, \$30,000 was awarded in grants to expand existing enterprises throughout the region. These monies were from a grant awarded by the Agricultural Diversification Program of the Texas Dept. of Agriculture. Two other grant awards were approved by the TDA for 1990 and 1991. Currently, the CPAIS has been selected to create a new proposal for 1992 activities.

As a 501(c)3 non-profit organization, the CPAIS will pursue grants from state and national foundations. Beginning in early 1990, the CPAIS discussed a low interest program with area banking institutions. Thirteen banks in eight cities have joined in their support for the incubator activities.

Each of the following banks have agreed to consider clients who have first created a business plan and proforma financial statements with the assistance of the CPAIS volunteers.

Participating are First National Bank, Eagle Lake; Commercial State Bank, El Campo; 1st National Bank, El Campo; Security Bank & Trust, Wharton; 1st Bank, El Campo, Edna and West Columbia; First State Bank of Louise, El Campo; Community State Bank, Wharton; 1st State Bank & Trust, Bay City; 1st National Bank, Bay City; City State Bank, Palacios and Victoria State Bank, Edna.

Each bank has complete autonomy considering these loan applicants after they have first been approved by the CPAIS Board. Foshee stated "The intent of the CPAIS will be to garner support from every banking organization in our service area. We have been informed this support is helpful in fulfilling requirements of the Credit Reinvestment Act (CRA)."

Finally, Foshee announced a quarterly newsletter entitled "The Grapevine" will be utilized to maintain a communication line with projects, allies, banking interests and area economic development entities.
