A panel of judges will select 10 winners to receive a \$1,000 check.

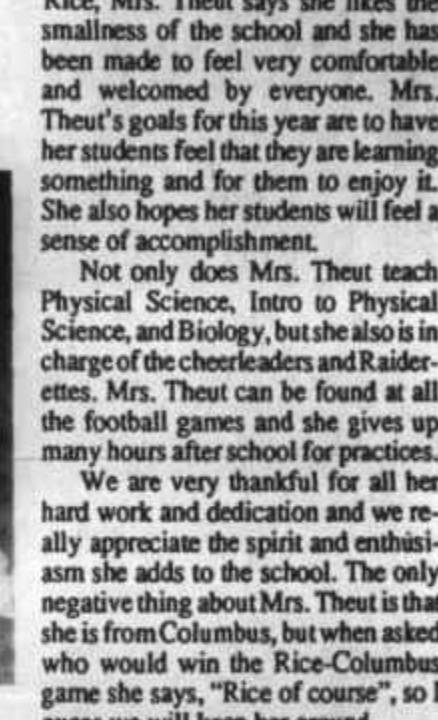


Meet the Lady Raiders
