Rice JV falls to Edna 42-26

The Edna Cowboys scored two fourth quarter touchdowns to overcome a stubborn Rice Raider team 42-26 last Thursday night in Edna.

Rice twice overcame two-touchdown leads by Edna in the first half to draw even with the Cowboys at intermission 20-20. Edna opened the scoring in the first period with a 15-yard run. The Cowboys added the two-point conversion to take a 8-0 lead. After the two teams traded the ball, David Godley ran 73 yards on a first and ten play for the Raiders' first score. The conversion was good on a pass from Charyan Thomas to Heath Mahalic to even the score at 8-8.

After Edna scored twice to take a 20-8 lead, Rice came roaring back to even the score, marching 60 yards on its first series in the second quarter to pull within 6 points. Thomas scored from 15 yards out on a quarterback sneak. The series was kept alive on a third and 11 play that saw Thomas throw 45 yards to Derrick Jones.

The next series saw the Raiders march 64 yards for their final score of the half. Thomas started the drive by throwing 41 yards to Tim Jones to take the Raiders to the Cowboy 23. Godley ran for 12 yards on the next play to take the Raiders to the Cowboy 11 and after two unsuccessful plays, Thomas hit Derrick Jones on a 11-yard scoring strike to even the score.

Rice was its own worst enemy in the second half. The Raiders fumbled the ball away three times. After Edna took a 34-20 lead, Thomas returned an Edna punt 75 yards for the Raiders final score of the evening.

Defensive standouts for the Raiders were Chapman, Rodney Guion, and John Kaluza. Offensively, Godley carried the ball 10 times for 106 yards and one score. Thomas completed four passes for 116 yards, one touchdown and a conversion toss.

The loss dropped the Raiders record to 2-2 for the year. The Raiders take on Needville Thursday night at Raider Stadium. Game time is 6 p.m. We hope to see you in the crowd.

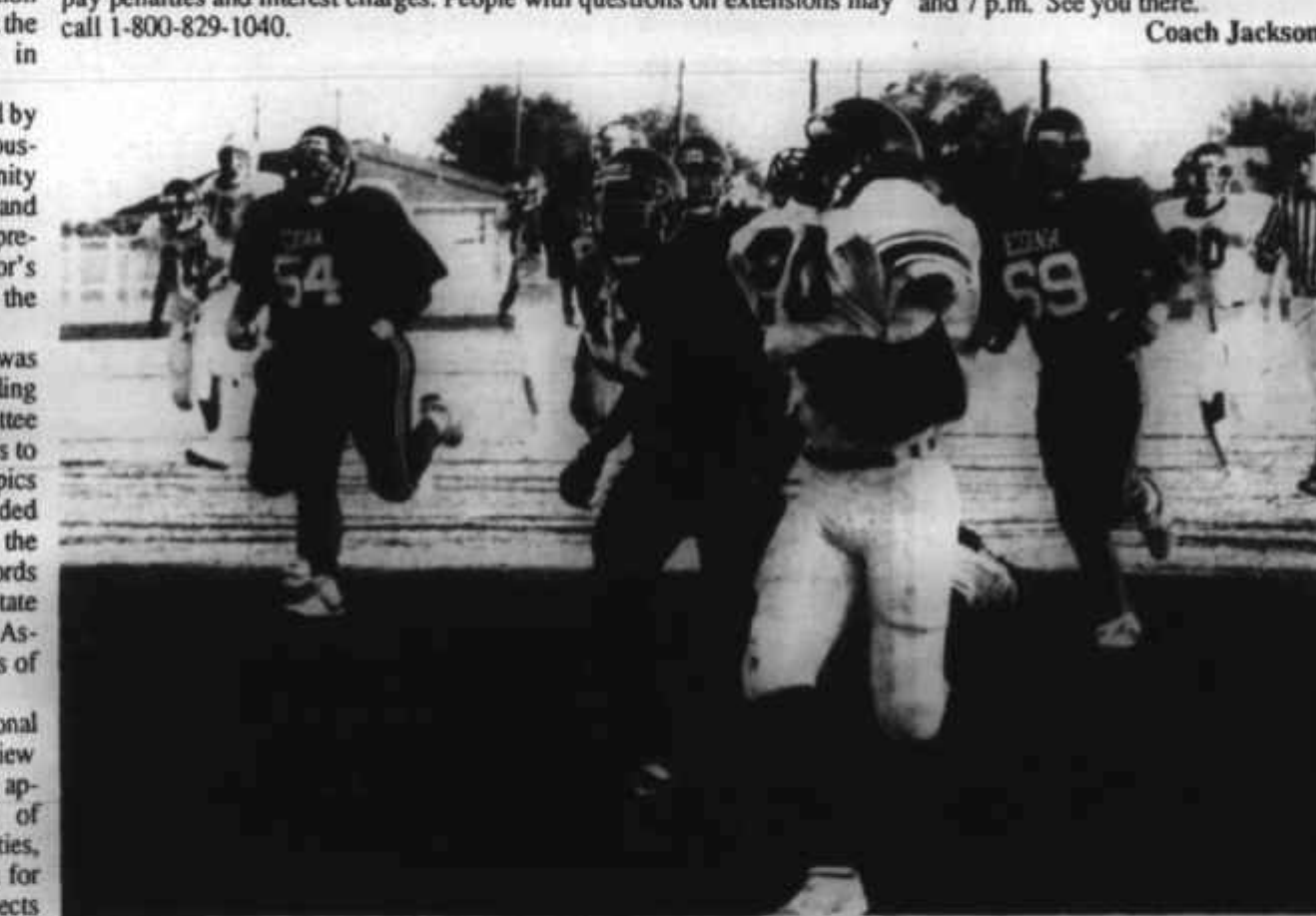
