Hospital upgrades mammography service with gift from Pink Ladies

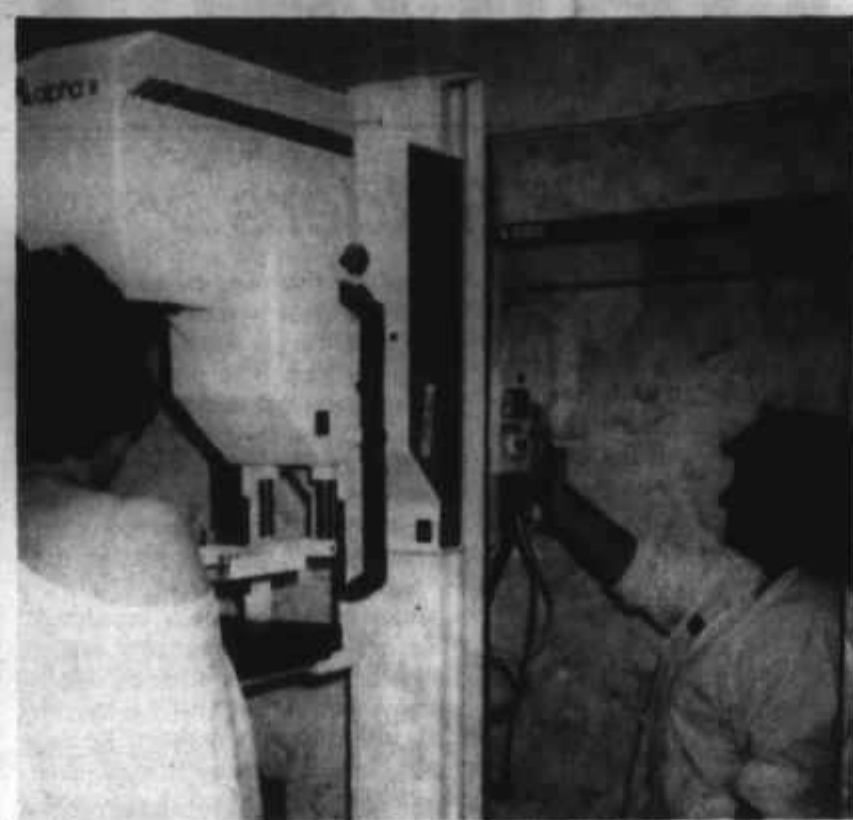
Eagle Lake Community Hospital has acquired a new mammography unit with the help of a \$20,000 gift offered by the Pink Ladies.

This new generation of mammography equipment has several advantages over the system it replaces. For the patient, the new mammography unit is able to illuminate smaller lumps of suspected cancer tissue. Yet the dose of radiation required to produce the image is much less, which increases the safety to the patient and to the hospital staff.

In addition, the new unit helps to qualify the hospital as a provider of Medicare reimbursable breast cancer screening services. This will allow area residents to directly arrange with the hospital to have a mammogram performed without first having physician's orders.

To enhance the patient's comfort and privacy, a room has been dedicated to provide women's services, including mammography. Remodeled under the direction of the Pink Ladies, the room has a decidedly feminine persuasion with attention given to making the patient feel secure.

Jim Buckner, hospital administrator, said that this is just the most recent



of gifts that the Pink Ladies have made. Just two years ago they made it possible to upgrade the x-ray equipment. Through the years, they have raised \$147,259.41 and have donated over 72,904 hours of service. Had it not been for their support, the hospital

could not serve the community with high technology and quality staff that it has.

The importance of pet therapy has been overlooked by many, although veterinarians probably have the most pragmatic information. Pet therapy has been included in many overall care plans of older persons recuperating from a serious medical condition.

Studies have indicated that those recovering from serious heart disease have increased their chances of survival during the first year following hospitalization when pet therapy was an integral part of the overall care. This is due to the fact that the person no longer feels isolated and has constant companionship.

The activity director at Heritage House has had pets brought to the facility at scheduled events and it has brought people out of rooms that do not like to venture out. This is another way of reaching out to each resident within the facility.

Children ages 6 to 12 will benefit from the "Kid Safe Program", to be held Saturday, Oct. 19, at the El

Campo Northside Center from 9 to 3. Kid Safe, a division of the National Safety Council, is designed to

cover a range of safety topics to children. Among those that are included in the local program are fire, traffic, electrical, choking, babysitting, guns, tornado and kitchen safety. The Pilot Club, one of several organizations volunteering for the event, has donated fingerprinting kits.

Classes will last approximately 20 minutes. The program is tailored to fit each community. El Campo, according to Ruth Kainer, Northside Executive Director, is looking for about 500 children to attend the classes. Parents are also encouraged to attend.
