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Texas ranks first in new job growth

State Comptroller John Sharp last week pointed to a silver lining in the cloud over the nation's recession-troubled economy.

Texas ranks first in new job growth among the 10 most populous states, for the first time since 1982.

"The turbulent Texas economy of the '80s is giving way to tamer times," Sharp predicted.

In 1992 and 1993, Texas will experience slow-to-moderate growth of about three percent annually with relatively low inflation. And that steady rate should continue over the next 10 years, compared to a national growth rate over the next decade of about 2.5 percent per year," Sharp said.

The news should be tempered somewhat by the fact that only three states — Texas, Ohio and Illinois — have seen job increases, while the recession pulled others down.

But it's real growth: last year Texas added 87,400 jobs, according to the comptroller.

Growth Where needed
The best part of this news is that the job growth has occurred in two

areas which suffered the most last decade.

Sharp said the fastest growth has been in the petrochemical sector of the Beaumont-Port Arthur area, and the maquiladora activity of Brownsville-Harlingen. Houston added more jobs over the past year than any metropoli-

Sharp predicted Houston will lead over the next three years with actual number of new jobs added, while El Paso will lead percentage-wise; San Antonio will advance slower than the state as a whole.

House Members Pled
Besides his misdemeanor ethics woes, five-term House Speaker Gib Lewis has increasingly been targeted with claims he has set up a mini-

dictatorship in the Texas House of Representatives.

He has been opposed, in somewhat underground fashion, by a small band of lawmakers seeking fair House rules.

Last month, state Rep. Dan Kubiak, D-Rockdale, sent all 150 House members an 11-point letter questioning their anonymous views on House rules reform, including issues such as:

- Whether to elect the speaker by secret ballot and/or limit speaker terms;
- Whether to abolish the controversial Calendars Committee, which allows bills to the House floor; and
- How to select committee chairmen and lay out amendments for debate.

Kubiak, a veteran of the House reform wars during the '70s Sharpstown scandal, acknowledged that more than 60 lawmakers had responded thus far, but declined to reveal any trends.

Bullock Backs Kerrey
U.S. Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Nebr., brought his presidential primary campaign to Texas last week and left with the endorsements of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and singer Willie Nelson.

Kerrey met privately with Gov. Ann Richards, who praised him but said she would remain neutral through the party primaries, and did not rule herself out as a vice presidential nominee.

Bullock said he decided to endorse Kerrey after becoming convinced that U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen would not run.

"Senator Bentsen is a personal friend, and I would like to see him run,"

but in my opinion, he's not going to," Bullock said.

Regarding Kerrey, Bullock said: "I think he's the man of the moment. He says all the right things to me."

Other Highlights
• The Associated Conservatives of Texas announced it is opposed to a statewide petition drive to limit terms of elected officials. The Dallas-based group urged Texans not to sign petitions being circulated by Texans for Term Limitations, headed by Republican Rob Mosbacher.

• The average property tax rate in Texas school districts has risen from \$1.06 per \$100 valuation last school year to \$1.20 this year, according to preliminary results of a survey by the state comptroller.

• Austin's State District Judge Scott McCown temporarily blocked the state insurance board from enforcing its emergency order barring insurance companies from charging higher rates or denying coverage to first-time auto insurance buyers.

• Last month, Richards blasted the state health department for "yawning indifference and criminal negligence" in regulating nursing homes; last week, the agency prepared to send nine cases to the attorney general seeking civil penalties against nursing home owners.

• Robert Lewis, president of the Texas Horse Racing Association, predicted the coalition of Texas churches against the lottery would fail: "They're 0-26 in other states. That's the bottom line."

• Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Tom Phillips charged that county commissioners who control the budgets of Texas' 390 state district courts sometimes retaliate against the judges for their court rulings. He urged funding reform.

Social Security number listed is number taxed

If you are involved in a banking transaction, such as opening an account for a dependent child or an adult, use care when listing the social security number.

When the savings institution issues a 1099-INT, "Statement for Recipients of Interest Income," for the account, interest income will show up on tax records based on the name listed first on the account and the social security number used.

If you pay taxes on the interest income, the name listed first on the account and the number you list should be your own. If the dependent reports the interest income, their name and number should be used.

Foot Facts

COLD FEET

Everybody gets them at one time or another, but what really causes cold feet? The culprit is usually poor circulation. When the tiny capillaries that nourish the nerves and skin of your feet constrict, the reduction in blood flow makes your feet cold. The expression "getting cold feet" came about because the tension that accompanies fear constricts capillaries. Cold feet are more of a problem with age, due to many of the age-related maladies that disrupt circulation: heart disease, diabetes, hardening of the arteries and varicose veins. Also, after years of heavy smoking and coffee drinking, the caffeine and nicotine that have been dumped into the body can have a severely constricting effect. Exercise can stimulate circulation, and drugs can be prescribed to temporarily open small blood vessels.

People with this problem may want to see their physician regarding an exercise regime that can help stimulate blood flow to the extremities.
