Raiders wiped out by Cardinals 52-0

The Rice Raiders lost their ninth game of the season last Friday in Columbus. Once again, the Raiders were defeated soundly by another district opponent. The Raiders could not manage any offense the entire night. They gained 46 total yards and four first downs during the game.

The Raiders fumbled eight times and lost four of those to the Cardinals. Those four fumbles led to four touchdowns for the Columbus team. The Raiders lost two fumbles on offense and two fumbles on the kicking game.

The Raiders were led by Marcus Dogins with eight tackles and three assists. These stats earned Dogins the defensive player of the week position. "Marcus has improved each week at the nose position. He is young and we expect a great deal from him as a junior and senior," commented Coach Johnson.

There was no award given for offensive player of the week or for line-man of the week.

The Raiders slowed down Columbus in the second half while allowing

six points in each period. In the first quarter the Raiders gave up 21 points. The second quarter saw them lose 19 more points.

This Friday, the Raiders will close their tough season by hosting the Falcons from Brookshire Royal. Game time will be 7:30 p.m. Parents Night will kick off around 7:05 p.m. All parents and/or families should be at the game by 7 p.m. and gather at the scoreboard end zone.

Thursday, the junior varsity will play El Campo at the high school.

Their game will begin at 5 p.m. on the track field. The Eagle Lake seventh and eighth grade teams will end their seasons at home against Brookshire Royal. The players and parents will be recognized on Friday night during halftime at the varsity game.

Rice JV falls to Columbus

Rice junior varsity football team couldn't overcome three Columbus touchdowns in the fourth period. The Raiders lost to their intracity rival 28-12 here last Thursday night.

Columbus opened the scoring in the first period on a six yard pass. The extra point was no good and the Cardinals led 6-0. Rice mounted a drive midway through the second quarter and appeared to have scored on a David Godley two yard run on fourth and goal, but a holding call wiped out the touchdown and the Raiders were unable to score in the first half.

The Raiders knotted the score at 6-6 midway through the third period when Charyn Thomas raced 32 yards on an option play. The kick was blocked and the score remained 6-6.

Columbus scored early in the 4th period on a 14 yard pass and converted the try for 2 to take a 14-6 lead. A miss hit on the ensuing kickoff landed in the hands of the Cardinals who promptly

drove the ball down to the Raider two yard line where they scored on a two yard run. The extra point was no good and the Cardinals led 20-6.

On their next series, the Raiders marched 68 yards and scored on Godley's 48 yard run. The conversion snap was fumbled bringing the Raiders to within eight points, 20-12.

Columbus scored on their next possession on a third and 14 yard pass play that covered 66 yards. The try for 2 was good and the Cardinals were ahead 28-12.

The Raiders' hopes for a comeback were dashed on the next series when the Cardinals intercepted a 2nd down pass. The game ended 28-12.

Offensive standouts for the Raiders were David Godley, Charyn Thomas, Charles Chapman and the entire offensive line.

Defensive standouts were Justin Kutzer, Chapman, John Kaluza, Gabe Garcia, Shawn Hurd and B.J. Dupre.

The loss dropped the Raiders to 2-7 for the year. The final game is this Thursday against El Campo at 5 p.m. on field three, located next to the baseball field.

Columbus crushes Rice Seventh grade, 14-0

Last Thursday, Columbus came to the field ready to play football and the Raiders did not.
