

BLISTERS

Hot weather tends to cause sweaty, slightly swollen feet which can rub inside

in otherwise well-fitted shoe. The result - a painful blister. Blisters are pockets of

fluid or blood beneath the outer layer of the skin. Constant irritation and rubbing, burns, poison ivy, and other skin diseases are most often responsible. Most blisters will go away by themselves once the cause is remedied, but occasionally they need

be drained. Your podiatrist can do this safely, infection is the major complication

If you get a blister, remove the source of the irritation. In general, blisters are better off left alone. The fluid inside will be gradually reabsorbed. Keep the blister covered with a bandage, gauze and tape. If it breaks, wash the area carefully with soap and water. If it shows signs of redness, drainage of pus, and swelling, call the
