The Raiders were completely dominated by La Grange last Friday night at the La Grange stadium. The Raiders helped La Grange by turning the ball over to them five times during the game. "The three fumbles in the first half hurt our chances to win. Even if we had turnovers we were still in the game," commented Coach Johnson.

On the first play from scrimmage, the Raiders turned over the ball which led to the Raiders' first score. On the second offensive drive the Raiders picked up their first down and their second fumble occurred around the 50 yard line. La Grange scored their second touchdown off the fumble by the Raiders.

With the score 21-0 in favor of the Leopards, the Raiders stopped the La Grange offense for the first time of the night. The Raiders' Jerome Haynes made two tackles for losses causing the Leopards to punt.

With the ball on the Raiders' 38 yard line, they began to get their offense rolling when Reginald Donner exploded for 38 yards on a run off the line. Then disaster struck.

A Raider fumbled on the Leopards 15 yard line. The Raiders got the ball back on the next play when the Leopards handed it right back. The Raiders then took seven plays to score from the 17 yard line. Donner scored on a one yard run behind the strong blocking of Melvin Anderson, Marcus Dogins, Haynes and Mark Johnson. Haynes added the extra point with a kick for

one point.

The Raiders defense stiffened and made the Leopards punt for the second time of the game. Haynes and Larry Garcia made good tackles to help stop the Leopards. "At this point, we were still in the game, though it was even put us in another tough situation," said Coach Johnson.

The Leopards went on to score their 28th punt with seconds left in the half.

In the third quarter, the Leopards increased their lead by scoring on the first drive of the second half. With the score 34-7, the Raiders drove 70 yards in seven plays for their second touchdown. On this drive the Raiders used a trick running play to keep the drive alive. Donner made 15 yards and Haynes kicked the PAT for the 14th point.

With the score 34-14, the Raiders could not stop the Leopards' ground game. La Grange scored on their first play after an unsuccessful onside kick by the Raiders. Then the Leopards' next two drives. These two scores were helped by two interceptions.

In the fourth quarter, the Raiders showed a great deal of class by scoring on their last opportunity. Ryan Thomas made a run over the Leopards for a touchdown. Haynes' PAT was good. The game ended with Leopards 55-Raiders 21.

**Offensive linebacker of the week** was Sam Mader. Mader graded out at 65%. This was his first experience on

the varsity level. "Sam did an excellent job of knowing who to block and did a good job of overpowering the person he had to block. We are very proud of his progress this season," commented Coach Johnson.

**Offensive player of the week** was Reginald Donner. He collected 137 yards on 23 carries and one touchdown.

**Defensive player of the week** was Jerome Haynes. Haynes made five tackles and one fumble recovery. "Jerome did an excellent job of being aggressive and taking care of his job," said Coach Johnson. Haynes made three tackles behind the line of scrimmage.

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### Osteoporosis: Special Problem for Women

Osteoporosis is the most common disease of the bone seen by physicians. An estimated 24 million Americans are affected by this condition. Although men can develop osteoporosis, it is a special problem for women. According to a recent article in *The Journal of Family Practice*, about one-half of all women over the age of 45 and ninety percent of all women over the age of 75 have osteoporosis.

Which women seem to be at greatest risk? The highest risk group includes women who are white or Asian, of low body weight, have small bone structure, and have a family history of the disease. Other risk factors include cigarette smoking, heavy alcohol use, low dietary intake of calcium, and a sedentary lifestyle.

What treatment options are available for at-risk women? Estrogen is the only prescription medicine approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for prevention of osteoporosis. For women who already have osteoporosis, many treatment options are available. Health experts now recommend 1,500 mg of calcium daily for postmenopausal women. Calcium, sodium fluoride and vitamin D have been shown to strengthen bone. Parathyroid hormone also has proven to be effective in treating osteoporosis.
