plain the county's liability to them. As of Tuesday afternoon, the Satskys were still waiting for his call.

Other Court Business

The concrete block building behind the County Jail was designated as the 9-1-1 site by the Court as requested by the 9-1-1 Implementation Committee Chairman Roy Van Noy. After verifying that all dispatching would be handled by the 9-1-1 staff as verbally agreed on by the Committee and Sheriff Bill Esterling, Commissioner Sonny Spaniel asked if it would be feasible to hold off on the 9-1-1 service until a new jail was built. (The Court feels the Commission on Jail Standards will require the county to build a new jail in the near future.) Spaniel's question was answered by Weimar City Manager Frank Parks, a member of the 9-1-1 Committee, who said it had always been understood that this was to be a temporary site. Commissioner Esterling really did not want to designate the building as the site until the Court knew if and when a new jail would be built, but the motion was made, seconded and passed in order to keep the process moving forward.

During the fixing of salaries and expense allowances for county offices, Commissioner Spaniel requested that employees be paid twice a month instead of once. The cost involved in this change, according to County Auditor Ramie Kana, would be the additional number of checks used and two weeks' worth of interest lost by the county on payroll taxes which would have to be paid earlier than they are presently.

Spaniel said he was "only think-

ing of his employees". His motion died for lack of a second.

Don Morrison Ford was awarded the bid for a new pickup truck for Precinct 4. The two bids received were from Lake Motors, Inc., of Eagle Lake for a 1992 Chevrolet at \$13,649 and Morrison for a 1992 F150 Ford pickup at \$12,985.

James Schroeder of W.A. Virmas & Sons, Sealy, was a little upset with Commissioners when Commissioner Elster recommended the Court accept the bid from Loessin Implement of Weimar for a new tractor for his precinct even though it was not the low bid. Elster picked Loessin's bid out of the 13 submitted because it was for a tractor of the same make as the one he is now using. Since the trade-in allowed by each of the bidders was not enough, according to Elster, he plans to keep using the older tractor.

Low bidder was Seifert & Son of Weimar at \$19,724 without trade or \$16,821 with trade in for a Fiat 100-92. Others submitting bids were Peter Ford Tractor of Columbus, \$19,981, \$17,481; Eagle Lake Implement, \$21,303 (no bid submitted with trade in); Kneek's Tractor Repair of Brimah, \$23,875, \$19,875; W.A. Virmas & Sons, Sealy, \$24,717, \$19,920 for a Massey-Ferguson tractor, and \$22,918 and \$18,121 for a Kubota.

Only two companies submitted bids on the county's group health insurance. The decision to renew the existing plan with Traveler's or to go to a partially self-funded plan proposed by Kneek's Tractor Repair of Brimah was tabled until after a work session could be held. The session, to include representatives from the Texas Association of Counties,

Weber-Peters-Nitsche and Commissioners Court, will center on the pros and cons of a self-funded plan now being used by some counties in the area.

Applications from the County and District Clerks, Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector for appointment of deputies were given the okay by the Court along with the appointment of members to the Colorado County Economic Development Council. A new Grievance Committee was selected from the names of those who served on the last Grand Jury.

Commissioners were told the E.P.A. had notified the county that no storm water discharge permit was needed for the closed landfill in Sheridan.

As requested by residents of Precinct 1 on Satterthwaite Road in the Sandy Creek Development, the road will now be named Willenborg Way. Commissioner Otto Loessin said it would only mean ordering a few street signs for the area and he had no objection.

Monies were transferred to each Commissioner based on the percentage of road miles in their precinct. Precinct 1 contains 179.75 miles, 24.69%; 2, 176.75 miles, 24.27%; 3, 216.8 miles, 29.77%; and 4, 154.9 miles, 21.27%. Total miles of road in the county is 728.2. Each precinct receives a \$50,000 base plus its percentage of the tax rate dollars.

Pay for Grand Jurors and Petit Jurors will remain the same as 1991; \$20 to serve and \$12 to show.

Contracts with Guadalupe County for juvenile detention services and with the Tax Appraisal District for collections were ratified by the Court.

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Rice School Board gives superintendent 3-year contract, hears from unhappy Eagle Lake resident

The Rice Consolidated Independent School District board of trustees approved a new three-year contract for Superintendent Carolyn McGaughey following an executive session during last week's regular monthly meeting. Trustee John Carey was absent from the meeting.

McGaughey's new contract becomes effective July 1 and will run through June 30, 1995.

Sam Center of Eagle Lake addressed the board on behalf of John Brasher and himself in regards to the use of the weight room at Eagle Lake Middle School.

The board recently approved a new policy in which the superintendent must approve all facility use through written request. Usage of the weight room was denied Center and Brasher after their usage of the facility for many years.

Center told the board since he and Brasher perform many hours of volunteer work, he feels something should be done and that there should be some way the facility can be used. He also told the board that it should make an effort to provide the community the most use of school facilities.

"I feel I serve as a role model for the student. It's not fair," said Center.

McGaughey reviewed Center's request form and told the board that liability is the problem. Board President John Matthews told Center the board appreciated his concern and the item will be placed on next month's agenda.

McGaughey presented a letter from the Colorado County Central Appraisal District regarding cancellation of certain delinquent real property taxes more than 20 years delinquent and personal property taxes more than 10 years delinquent.

The board heard a report on the results of the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test given in Oct. of last year in grades three, five, seven, nine and 11 across the state.

The percentage of Rice students passing all three sections of the test, which requires 70 percent mastery of all objectives tested, compared with the state average by grade were:

When firefighters arrived flames were already in the second story and the attic, cutting into Fire Chief Daryl Getson.

One firefighter, Curtis Rose, was sent to the hospital suffering from smoke inhalation. He was treated and released.

Getson said the fire was difficult to control because the house had uneven roof lines. "We could see the fire between layers of the roof but it was hard to get to in places."

The fire was put out in about two hours. By the time firemen had double-checked everything and cleaned up, they returned to the station around 11:30 p.m.

The damages assessment was not yet available at press time.

City signs new agreement with Southwestern Bell Telephone

Although the franchise agreement between the City of Eagle Lake and Southwestern Bell Telephone did not expire until Jan. 1993, City Council members passed the new standardized ordinance presented to them by Bell.

The new franchise not only means an increase of revenue for the City, but also gives a more accurate estimate of the monies which will now be paid quarterly instead of annually.

After Acting City Manager Lucille Perry explained the changes and advantages to Council members, they unanimously agreed to make the five year agreement effective April 1st.

Another decision facing Council Monday evening, Jan. 14th, was the problem of airport liability insurance coverage. Even though a notice had been published, there were no bids to be opened on the designated date of Friday, Jan. 10. On top of that, the current coverage expired at 12:01 a.m. Wednesday morning making it imperative that the City obtain coverage.

Perry contacted two local agencies Friday to find Mrs. Doris Thomas at W.M. Thomas Jr. Insurance Agency would be amable to bid due to her mother's illness and Eagle Lake Insurance Associates was still waiting for a quote from one of the many companies they had contacted. Eagle Lake Insurance was asked to submit the bid as soon as the quote was received due to the urgency of the situation. Their bid of \$840 was approved by Council.

Other Council Business

- Following a presentation by Bill Harrison Jr. on behalf of Cen-Tex Certified Development Corporation, Council voted to allocate \$1,000 as their portion of the "seed money" requested by Cen-Tex to set up a small business loan fund. This fund will be used to finance loans ranging from \$5,000 to \$50,000 which are not covered by Small Business Administration loans.
- The money gathered by Cen-Tex for this project will be matched 3:1 by a grant from the Economic Development Administration, a part of the

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Views On Dental Health

EXTRA TEETH

Most of us have to worry about having too few teeth, but there are children whose problem is that they have too many. These extra teeth that may develop in your child's mouth are known as SUPERNUMERARY TEETH. They can occur singly or in multiples and are usually found in the upper front area of a child's mouth. Occasionally they occur elsewhere as in the lower molar area.

These extra teeth usually don't erupt, but are often located in a position that prevents proper eruption of permanent teeth. The primary means of detection of supernumerary teeth is by x-ray. As with any toothed teeth, this situation should be diagnosed and evaluated early to avoid later problems with eruption and malocclusion. Generally, dentists prefer to remove supernumerary teeth.
