State lawmakers brought 'screaming and kicking into a new decade'

The U.S. Supreme Court may have brought Texas, screaming and kicking, into a new decade where two bonafide political parties compete for independent voters.

Last week, the high court rejected the state attorney general's request to throw out federal court redistricting plans which Democrats fear will give Republicans a majority in the Texas Senate and close to one in the Texas House.

Ruling Blasted, Praised
 Immediately, various Democrats loudly criticized the three-judge federal panel, the Texas Republican Party, and even their own leaders for misquoting their legislative cards.

"What the Republican Party failed to accomplish at the ballot box, they engineered from behind the bench, cloaked in the black robes of Republican judges," said Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

But the Republican Party of Texas

hailed the ruling. "For the first time, we're going to have fair elections for the state Senate," GOP Chairman Fred Meyer said.

The court's ruling means that Texas will be among the 11 states holding presidential primaries on Super Tuesday, March 10.

Meanwhile, Attorney General

Dan Morales said he will continue his investigations into allegations that state Rep. George Pierce, R-San Antonio, assisted James Nowlin, a federal judge in Austin, in drawing the court's Senate plan.

Morales said he would not have

made the investigation public and brought it to the Supreme Court's attention if Nowlin had not sealed the court's records detailing how it drew its maps.

First In Speaker's Race
 The race to replace Speaker Gib Lewis drew two historical firsts last week: the first woman and the first black candidates.

State Rep. Betty Denton, D-Waco, became the first woman to announce, followed closely by Wilhelmina Delco, D-Austin, the first black to seek the post.

The rules reform movement seems to be all the rage with speaker candidates now, as the oft criticized committee chairman of Speaker Lewis now talk reform.

Judges Went Too Far?
 U.S. Attorney General William Barr said federal judges went too far in trying to correct unconstitutional conditions in Texas prisons and will support efforts to remove court-imposed limits to prison populations.

State officials estimate 3,000 empty prison beds could be freed for use. The population limit placed in Texas by federal judge William Wayne Justice prompted the early release of thousands of criminals from Texas prisons and spurred the Legislature to raise billions for new prisons with taxes and bonds.

New Ethics Commission
 Some describe it as a "weak sister" but the new Texas Ethics Commission got a political foothold thrown at it right off the bat, nevertheless.

Tom Smith, director of Public Citizen, a watchdog group, asked members to regulate campaign contributions in the coming House speaker's race, and "fill in the gaps" of a traditionally loose structure.

Smith said the commission also should decide if outgoing Gib Lewis can continue to use political funds to pay legal expenses for his upcoming ethics trial in Austin.

Lottery Start-up
 State Lottery Director Nora Linares said she has mailed out more than 56,000 applications to retailers who want to sell \$1 lottery tickets for the state. Linares hopes to enlist 15,000 to 20,000 retailers in the next four months. The retailers will make a nickel on every dollar they sell.

To receive a license, applicants must submit a \$125 application fee, a set of fingerprints and undergo a criminal history check.

Other Highlights
 Former Gov. Mark White resigned from the Hermann Hospital Trust board, the trust used to do

amid a probe of trustee abuses. Media reports linked the Houston hospital's \$245,000 meat purchase from financially troubled Granada Foods to White, a partner in the law firm representing Granada.

State Sen. Chet Brooks, D-Pasadena, challenged Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, to a "street bowl" to promote anti-gang and drug efforts. The bowl will feature community teams fielding questions about gangs, drug abuse, and school dropouts in a college bowl format.

Some 25 House incumbents, or one-sixth of the membership, will not be returning to the legislature.

San Antonio's state Sen. Frank

Tejeda was the only person from either party to file in his new congressional district.

State Sen. Gene Green, D-Houston, candidate for a new congressional seat there, said he has plans for a national health care system which guarantees health insurance for all without a tax increase.

The quasi-governmental Texas Workers' Compensation Insurance Fund said it now sells coverage cheaper than the assigned risk pool, the insurer of last resort.

With \$1.2 billion to build 12 new prisons, the Texas Dept. of Criminal Justice is getting proposals from several towns which would like one.

More political announcements... Saunders files for re-election to legislature



Robert Saunders has announced that he has filed for re-election to the Texas Legislature. He has issued the following statement.

State Representative Robert Saunders, a Democrat from La Grange, announced that he had filed for re-election to seek a seventh term in the Texas Legislature. He is seeking election in the new 28th Legislative Dis-

trict which includes Bastrop, Colorado, Fayette and Wharton counties. Since he was first elected to the house in 1980, Saunders has served the district in many ways. Saunders was Chairman of the Agriculture and Livestock Committee for two terms and is currently in his third term as Chairman of the Environmental Affairs Committee.

Along with responsibility of a chairmanship and a four term membership on the powerful State Affairs Committee, Saunders has also been appointed to several special committees. Rep. Saunders has served as a member of the Environmental Committee to the National Conference of State Legislators for a number of years. He also serves as a co-chairman of the Task Force on Solid Waste Management, Chairman of the House Select Committee on Coastal Preservation, Chairman of the subcommittee on Agricultural Non-Point Source Pollution to the Joint Interim Committee on the Environment, Chairman of the Transitional Legislative Natural Resource Board, a member of the Task Force on Oil Spills and Water Pollution Abatement, the Hazardous Waste Reduction Advisory Committee, and a Texas appointee to serve on the Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission.

With all these responsibilities, Saunders will continue to play a major role in the state's environmental policies. Throughout his years in the legislature, he has been given numerous awards to reward him for the work he has done for many organizations.

His list of awards include State Friend of Extension, Distinguished Service Award from the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association, Legislator of the Year awards from the Lone Star Sierra Club, the Sportsman's Clubs of Texas, Texas Outdoor Writers, Texas Black Bass Unlimited and the Texas Game Wardens Association. He has also been awarded for his outstanding work in

wildlife resource legislation by the Texas Wildlife Association and by the Independent Cattlemen's Association for his outstanding leadership to the Texas livestock industry and the Cattlemen's Council.

During his 12 years of service to the district, Saunders has been instrumental in many different legislative areas. He was a founding member of the Rural Health Care Caucus and was instrumental in helping pass the Rural Health Care bill in 1989. During the 72nd Legislature, Saunders was the House sponsor of several landmark environmental bills which include the Hazardous Waste Reduction Policy Act, the Omnibus Recycling Act, the Clean River Act, the Solid Waste Fee Act, the State Clean Air Act, and the Natural Resources Conservation Commission Act, better known as the Environmental Agency Consolidation bill.

Among the major topics of the next decade, Saunders lists the issues of public school finance, health care and the environment to be the most important. "The decisions we make are not easy, but with the future of Texas at stake, they are choices that have to be made. It is important that our children and their children be able to enjoy life in the great state of Texas that we have all grown to know and love."

Rep. Saunders is a native of Smithville in Bastrop County. He currently resides in La Grange with his wife, Claudine, and their three sons. Claudine is a teacher in the La Grange Independent School District and grew up in Columbus. His son, John, is attending Texas A&M University, while his other two sons, Matthew and Richard, attend La Grange ISD.

Saunders holds a Bachelor of Science degree in math and physics and a Masters degree in education and counseling from Southwest Texas State University. He is currently president of M&S Distributing, Inc. in La Grange.

Jandt to run for district 25 judgeship

In announcing her decision to seek the office of district judge, Jandt stated that she felt her 23 years experience as a county attorney was excellent training for a judge. Dealing with issues and situations where the objective is making a decision based on justice for the community gives one a perspective that is different from representing a client or an interest group.

Since then, he had won numerous wheelchair athletic competitions including a bronze medal at the Paralympics in Seoul, Korea in 1988.

Foot Facts

 AVOIDING AMPUTATIONS FOR DIABETICS

One of the most debilitating aspects of diabetes is the loss of extremities due to poor circulation. Sadly, more than 50,000 diabetic Americans undergo foot or leg amputations every year. The good news is that these amputations may be preventable in as many as 85 percent of cases, according to federal health officials. The key is proper foot care. In a diabetic patient, loss of sensation in a foot and foot deformities can lead to ulcerated pressure points. Untreated, these can result in infection, osteomyelitis and gangrene.
