
Hillary Herman baptized

PREVENTING BONE LOSS

In addition to straightforward calculation problems, the contest will also include geometric and stated problems similar to those found in recently adopted high school algebra, geometry and trigonometry textbooks.
The math skills involved include the use of any silent, hand held calculator that does not receive auxiliary electric power. The contestants may write on the test paper or on the scratch paper provided. The test lasts thirty minutes and answers may be written in decimal or in power of ten notation of the form 1.23x10-6.

Whitcomb gets degree at SHSU


