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Digitalis Side Effects: What to Look For  
Digitalis is a common name for a group of medicines that have been prescribed for over 200 years to treat congestive heart failure. It was not until the 1940s that the mechanism of action of the digitalis medicines became known. The most commonly prescribed of the digitalis medicines is digoxin.  
Digitalis causes an increase in the output of the heart without causing a corresponding increase in blood pressure. Digitalis commonly is used with diuretic medicines (water pills) for the treatment of heart failure. One of the problems associated with digoxin use is its so-called "narrow therapeutic index." What this means is that the difference between an effective blood level and a toxic blood level of medicine is very narrow. If digitalis is not taken correctly, adverse effects can result.  
Digitalis users should be aware of adverse effects that sometimes can occur. Some persons may experience visual problems, such as altered color perception, flashing lights, or the presence of a yellow halo around objects. Gastrointestinal problems include nausea and vomiting. Other side effects include fatigue, depression, and lethargy. If side effects are suspected, the medicine should be stopped and the prescribing physician contacted.

## Catholic Schools Week is Jan. 26-Feb. 1

The Diocese of Victoria will kick off Catholic Schools Week, Jan. 26 through Feb. 1, with a special ceremony on Monday, Jan. 26, beginning at 10:30 a.m. at the Catholic Chantry, 1505 E. Mesquite Lane in Victoria.

The theme is linked to the national observance in 1992 of Christopher Columbus landing in America.

## Disaster relief programs available for all needs

Fifteen assistance programs are available to farm and ranch families as well as workers and small businesses in the flood ravaged Texas counties that have been declared federal disaster areas.  
Programs and the assistance available through each one are given here.  
1. Farm assistance: The Farmers Home Administration may make emergency loans to farmers or ranchers to compensate them for actual losses to essential property or production capacity. For more information contact the county FmHA office.  
2. Other agricultural services: Farmers and ranchers may apply for cost sharing grants for emergency conservation programs, such as debris removal from crop or pasture lands, repairs to land or water conservation structures and fencing. The Emergency Feed Program is to assist in feeding livestock where feed was destroyed by flood water. For more information contact the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office for Colorado County.  
3. Disaster unemployment assistance: This assistance provides weekly payments to people who are unemployed due to a disaster. It includes self-employed persons, farmers, farm and ranch owners and workers not covered by regular unemployment insurance programs. The assistance is through the Texas Employment Commission.  
4. Tax assistance: The Internal Revenue Service allows casualty losses that are suffered on home, personal property and household goods to be deducted on income tax returns if these items are not covered by insurance. For information call the IRS at 1-800-424-1040.  
5. Disaster housing assistance program: The Federal Emergency Management Agency may provide funds for alternate rental housing or emergency home repairs for those who have lost their permanent residence.  
6. Individual and family grant program: Grants are available for eligible victims to meet serious needs or necessary expenses not covered by other disaster programs or insurance. The Texas Department of Human Resources administers this program.  
7. Home/personal property disaster loans: Disaster loans through the Small Business Administration are available to home owners and renters for restoring or replacing uninsured property.  
8. Emergency assistance: Emergency food, clothing, shelter and medical assistance may be provided to individuals and families affected by a disaster. Assistance may be available through the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army, as well as church groups and voluntary organizations.  
9. Business disaster loans: Disaster loans through SBA are available to repair or replace destroyed or damaged business buildings, inventory,
