



The first thing to determine is whether or not reconstruction is feasible. If your dentist tells you that you still have at least 50 percent of your bone support, you probably have an excellent chance for a lasting reconstruction. Moreover, if you have one natural tooth for each missing one to be replaced -- two teeth missing and two for support, for instance -- the situation is acceptable depending on the location of the supporting teeth.

In some cases, three missing teeth, and two strong supports also work out well. Longer spans than that are very risky; they may actually shorten the life of supporting teeth.

Wherever possible, the fixed bridge is usually recommended, though the removable bridge has its place. There are also aesthetic considerations when visible teeth are involved.



Wherever possible, the fixed bridge is usually recommended, though the removable bridge has its place. There are also aesthetic considerations when visible teeth are involved.
