The Colorado County Commissioners turned down a request by the Sheridan Park and Recreation Committee (SPARC) to sponsor a matching funds grant to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for developing a multi-use park in Sheridan.

The park plans included a swimming pool, concession-restroom building, soccer field, playground area, covered picnic pavilion and two Little League fields.

At a meeting of the committee, Jan. 30, it was decided to continue plans for a full scale park even though development will have to be slower.

The first step will be to go ahead with the purchase of land in the area to the north and west of the present Little League property.

The committee wishes to thank Jean and Zella Walker for their generous donation of seven lots, the parents and teachers of Sheridan for their \$2,000 cash donation and the Sheridan Lions Club for their \$2,000 cash donation toward the park.

Other foundations and corporations have been applied to for funds to carry out these projects. A priority would be a concession-restroom-storage building adjoining the Little League fields so they can be used for games this year. SPARC and the Little League will welcome any donations of cash, time and/or materials toward this cause.
