## Get rid of old chemicals during 'Amnesty Day'

Properly disposing of old agricultural chemicals has been an extremely difficult and expensive problem for farmers and ranchers. In most cases these unwanted chemicals are those that can no longer be used.

To address this problem, the Texas Water Commission, Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have developed plans to hold an "Amnesty Day."

It will be Feb. 24 at the Jackson County Solid Waste Transfer Station on Hwy. 59, five miles east of Edna. This will allow you to take these unwanted chemicals to a central site and properly dispose of them at no cost.

If you need more information about the program, please contact County Agent Rick Jahn at 409-732-2082.

Colorado County Extension Agent Rick Jahn would like to encourage everyone to take precautions when handling and transporting any of these chemicals.

If the container is in bad shape, try to secure it with additional packaging. If you have a rusty old barrel or can that has the potential to leak, take appropriate steps to insure that it does not leak while in transit.

There are two or three agricultural chemicals that will not be accepted. They will not accept oil or paint.

In addition to "Amnesty Day," agricultural chemical containers will be collected for recycling. These containers must be rinsed properly, according to the label, before they will be accepted.
