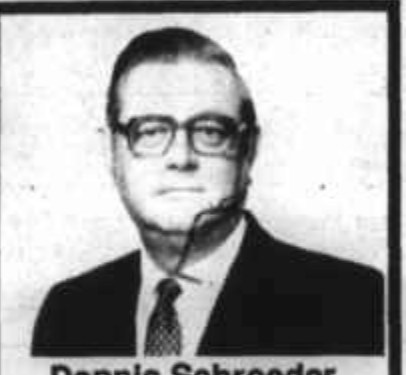

OSTEOARTHRITIS AND YOUR FEET

The most common form of arthritis is osteoarthritis, also known as degenerative arthritis. It affects about half of all arthritis sufferers. When it strikes the feet, it can be particularly distressing. Although there is little soft tissue swelling, joints often become enlarged, stiff and painful. Anti-inflammatory drugs may be prescribed for the pain, and certain exercises can relieve some of the pressure by strengthening muscles around the joints. Walking and rolling an empty soft drink bottle under the foot are often useful techniques. Your doctor may also perform ultrasound or heat treatments. For more advanced, debilitating cases, surgery may be recommended to remove bony particles or replace the joint with an artificial implant.
