### 'But there comes a time to take a stand'

Dear Editor:

As I woke to a beautiful Easter Sunday morning, I noticed something strange in my front yard. A burned cross was standing where my school board candidate's sign had been the night before.

It appeared that an opponent of John Matthews decided to burn all of the Matthews-for-re-election signs on our street. After further investigation, I found that numerous houses and locations throughout the community which were displaying Matthews signs had been vandalized as well.

I would have dismissed this as some childish prank if it were not for the fact that only one candidate's signs had been vandalized.

As I looked at the burned cross in my yard, I recalled the horrors of the Ku Klux Klan and how they too had come in at night and left burning crosses for a cause which was so narrow-minded and lacking in foresight and vision. I also reflected on the values instilled in me by my father who served on the school board here for many years. Knowing the dignity and dedication demanded by this position, I am appalled that someone would stoop so low as to use such childish pranks as burning property.

Never in the past have I taken a public stand in support of a candidate for public office, because of the nature of my business in this community and because of the experiences my family went through when my father was a school board member. Before I have not been willing to put my children in the position of being victimized by hatred.

There were many hard decisions my father had to make in the 60's concerning Eagle Lake High School accreditation and the new consolidation which is now the Rice Consolidated Independent School District. The pain of his taking those stands is with me still. But there comes a time to take a stand.

When posting the Matthews sign in my yard, I thought I was at last making a quiet statement about my faith in continued good judgment and forward-thinking dedication to our school children. The burning of the property in my yard now dictates a more bold statement.

Having been responsible for five children attending the Rice School System, I have had many discussions with school board members on school policies. On all occasions, I have found them to be objective and very sensitive to my needs by keeping their promises to the voters of this district; being reasonable, responsible and sensible; always keeping the interests of Rice School children number one.

Good judgment sometimes causes trustees to take stands which are unpopular with citizens who do not understand the whole picture, but only see the piece of the puzzle which impacts them personally.

I know that our present trustees' efforts have directly affected the improved academic atmosphere at the high school. I know that my youngest son now benefits from a fine primary school facility and an excellent writing-to-read program; both of which would have been unlikely without their efforts.

I now encourage others to support reason rather than reactionary and impulsive self-interests represented by the burning of these signs.

## Governor plays hide and watch with federal courts on public school financing

Whether Gov. Ann Richards calls state lawmakers to Austin for a special session on public school financing will probably depend on a federal court judge's actions. U.S. District Court Judge James Nowlin is considering a class action lawsuit on whether the state can collect an illegal tax. Nowlin last week asked attorneys from the state and taxpayers to try to settle their dispute within two weeks.

Should Nowlin rule that the state can collect the tax, the governor said the heat is off her to schedule the special session. Richards thinks the state would have to act immediately, though, if the judge decides the state cannot collect the tax.

The Texas Supreme Court ruled in January that the current system of paying for schools using the County Education District tax is unconstitutional. However, the high court did say the tax may be collected this year and next so the Legislature can put

Together a new finance system.

"If the federal court rules against the collection of that tax, then we very definitely will be (in Austin) on May 11," Richards told reporters.

**Meek Resigns from PUC**  
Public Utility Commissioner Paul Meek headed the advice of Gov. Ann Richards and Attorney General Dan Morales and resigned his position from the state regulatory agency.

Meek, an appointee of former Gov. Bill Clements, had been accused of violating state law while serving as a member of the PUC and chairman of Fina, Inc., a company that sells fuel to utilities. Meek's resignation was not nullified, though, and Meek will not be prosecuted because he was unaware of the conflict of interest.

Since 1989, Fina has sold more than \$11 million of natural gas and co-generated power to utilities regulated by the PUC. The AG's office said Meek could have been prosecuted if he had clear prior knowledge of a conflict of interest. But Morales staff feels confident that such knowledge did not exist until Meek received a letter from the attorney general. Meek had to step down or sever his ties with Fina.

This means Richards will be able to make her second appointment to the three-member commission.

**Tax Group Files Lawsuit**  
A taxpayers group is suing to stop the state government from paying its bills because the Legislature "flagrantly disregarded" the Texas Constitution in writing the 92-93 budget.

The suit was filed by Texans for Limited Taxation, four private citizens and State Reps. Warren Chium, D-Pampa, and Talmadge Hefflin, R-Houston.

They allege the budget approved last year violated a 1978 constitutional amendment designed to limit growth of government spending to the growth rate of the state's overall economy.

**Nine Cities on Burglary List**  
Of the 25 U.S. cities with the highest burglary rates in 1989, nine were in Texas, said Jerry Johns of the Southwestern Insurance Information Service Inc. He said a partnership comprising individuals, businesses and government is needed "if this out-of-control situation is to ever be corrected."

Texas cities on the list were Wichita Falls, Waco, Dallas, San Antonio, Fort Worth, Arlington, Midland and Houston. Property and auto theft losses in 1990 exceeded \$1 billion, Johns stated. He said losses drive up the cost of insurance.

**Other Highlights**  
A spokesman for Attorney General Dan Morales said a possible lawsuit against Alcoa Company of America has been deferred because the firm had begun cleaning up mercury contamination in Lavaca Bay. Alcoa announced it has agreed to reimburse federal and state agencies \$400,000 for cleanup work already done.

Texas Water Commission declared the Edwards Aquifer an underground river, and took regulatory control over the water supply for 1.5 million Texas residents. The commission even changed the name to the Edwards Underground River.

The Texas Railroad Commission is examining the possibility that an overfilled salt dome and a malfunctioning valve caused the April 7 pipeline explosion near Brenham that killed three people.

### GOUT: THE TRUTH COMES OUT

Folklore used to preach that gout was a sinner's payback for a life of too much wine and rich food. Today we know that gout is a metabolic disorder, often linked to heredity, in which swelling and inflammation attack one or more of the body's joints. The big toe is the usual target. Several medications are effective in clearing up the condition. Diet does play a role, however. Some foods are high in purines, which are compounds that form the uric acid responsible for triggering the disease. People prone to gout might be advised to limit intake of foods such as organ meats, herring, anchovies, mussels, sardines, scallops, asparagus, rich gravies, alcohol, tea and coffee.

Gout may usually occur more frequently in males than in females, however, both can be afflicted with this disease.
