Colorado County Sheriff's Report

He placed the woman under arrest and released the driver at the suspect's request. She was transported to the sheriff's office and booked for possession of marijuana (class B).

Monday, April 20, at approximately 4:38 a.m., Deputy Peters observed a 1979 Buick parked beside a 1983 Honda Accord with Nevada license plates in the rest area on I-10.

The trunk latch of the Buick was punched so Peters went to investigate. He observed two white males sleeping in the Buick. He also noted the radios had been torn out of both vehicles and the keys were in the ignition of the

Honda, even though no one was in it. Peters could see what appeared to be marijuana and a clip in the Buick. He woke the occupants and had them exit the vehicle then smelled the odor of marijuana.

Peters searched the Buick, finding marijuana seeds, zig-zag rolling papers and a scale. There were also bags with marijuana seeds scattered through them on the floor.

The driver of the Buick, Joseph Anthony, was placed under arrest for possession of marijuana (class B). No charges were filed against the passenger. No contraband was found in the Honda.

Anthony was transported to the sheriff's office for booking. His vehicle was driven to the sheriff's office at the driver's request.

All pupils registering for kindergarten must be five years old before Sept. 1, 1992. All children born after Sept. 1, 1987, will be too young to attend kindergarten.

Before a pupil can begin school the child will need to have a birth certificate, a social security number and a shot record which includes a DPT and polio immunization since his/her fourth birthday.

Copies of these records will be made at the school and the originals will be returned to the parents. Please bring these three items to the registration with the pupil.

Children currently registered in prekindergarten will not need to register for kindergarten next year.

To register for prekindergarten on May 11, the children must have a birth certificate, social security number and shot record.

The other requirements for pre-K are: pupils must be four years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1992; they must be unable to pass an English Proficiency Test; and to qualify for the free lunch program, proof of family income is required.

The pre-K registration will be from 12:30 to 4 p.m. and the school plans to screen all new pre-K pupils in the academic area and in the health area.
