## Parks & Wildlife sets additional hearings next week on proposed regulations

Twenty-two additional public hearings have been scheduled for selected parts of the state from April 27 through May 1 to hear comments on the amended proposals to the 1992-93 hunting and fishing regulations promulgated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The public will be able to comment on an amendment to add one day to the end of the 1992 archery deer and turkey season, giving bowhunters five complete weekends. If approved the season will run Oct. 1 to Nov. 1.

An experimental muzzleloader season has been proposed for Oct. 17-25 in 14 counties in the Edwards Plateau and South Texas. These areas contain relatively high deer density so

the additional hunting pressure is not a source of concern.

Inland fisheries branch is proposing to regulate mussel harvesting. The proposal would limit mussel harvesters to 75 pounds a day on weekends and allow harvesting only during daylight hours. The proposal would allow harvesting by hand only and also calls for minimum length limits on several species.

A proposal from coastal fisheries will clarify that it is illegal to possess a stone crab's left claw on board a vessel in public waters. They also propose to adjust pickup times for saltwater trotlines. Currently trotline hooks and lines must be removed by 1 p.m. each Friday and not replaced

until 1 p.m. Sunday. The proposal would allow the lines to be picked up later or otherwise adjusted for safety reasons based on small craft warnings from the National Weather Service.

Public hearings are scheduled all over the state. The ones in this area will be: April 27 in Victoria at Town Plaza Mall, 1502 E. Airline; April 27 at Corpus Christi State University, 6300 Ocean Dr., Room 117; April 28 in Galveston County Courthouse Jury Assembly Room; May 1 in Beaumont at Jefferson County Courthouse.

All hunting and fishing regulations will be finalized May 21 at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission meeting in Austin.

A field day is planned Wednesday, April 29, for interested pecan producers. The event begins at 5:30 p.m. at the Hajovsky Orchard near Holman.

Bill Ree, extension entomologist, and Dr. Jerral Johnson, extension plant pathologist, will speak on scouting and timing for pecan nut casebearer control, pecan scab, pruning and general insect and disease control.

To get to the Hajovsky Orchard, take Hwy. 155 north from Weimar at Holman Community Center take Co. Road 493 east until it intersects with Co. Road 489 near the orchard.

This program is sponsored by the Fayette-Colorado County Pecan Committee and Texas Agricultural Extension Service. All their programs serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

## Raiders soar past the Falcons

Ernest Sims was three for three and Kevin Jackson homered to lead Rice past Brookshire-Royal in a big way, 21-2, Tuesday, April 14.

After taking the Falcons to a two point lead, the Raiders scored four runs in the second, eight runs in the third, five runs in the fourth and four runs in the fifth innings.

Jackson started the Raiders' binge by homering to lead off the second inning. E. Sims followed with a single to left. He stole second and scored on an error by the Royal first baseman on a grounder by Will Atkins.

After the Raiders loaded the bases, Raymond Ford hit a two-run single to right to drive in Ragen Stienke and Shane Laake ending the scoring for the inning.

In the third, eight Raiders crossed the plate. Combined with four hits, three walks and three Royal errors, Rice jumped out to a 12-2 lead. The big blows in the inning were an RBI double by Norman Botard and a two-run single by Aaron Machac.

Machac drove in two more runs in the fourth when he singled to right to drive in Kerry Sims who had singled

and Botard. Following a walk to Jackson, E. Sims singled to left scoring Ford. Machac scored on the play when the Falcon left fielder misplayed Sims' base hit.

The Rice Raiders rounded off their scoring with four more runs in the fifth inning. Rice was issued six walks in the inning with Jackson and E. Sims collecting RBIs.

Machac was the winning pitcher, going three and a third innings allowing two runs on three hits while striking out five. Laake pitched the final one and two thirds innings striking out three and allowing no base runners.
