

The Regulations Committee will hear public input on the proposed white-tailed deer hunting regulations for the 1993-94 season. All public comments on the proposed regulations are welcome. (A hearing is also scheduled for the same day in Nacadoches at 1 p.m, at the Holiday Inn.)

Zero doe days are proposed in all areas that had two or four doe days the past three seasons. Antierless deer may be harvested in the zero doe areas only after a landowner makes an application for management plan permits. Only landowners with a verified surplus of does and those under an approved management plan will be allowed to harvest antlerless deer.

Doe days are proposed for the first six days of the season in the areas that had doe days the first nine and last nine days of the season the past three years. There are no split doe day seasons proposed for 1993. The proposed regulations will be presented for the first time at the ommission's regular hearing Jan. 21 at 9 a.m. in Austin.
