The Lady Cardinals had a height advantage which took its toll on the young Rice team. They came up short in the scoring as well, losing 35 to 28 to Columbus.

In the second half, the Lady Raiders freshmen outscored the Card ladies but it was not enough to make up for

the 11 point first half deficit.

"Our defense did pretty well but our offense didn't have its usual punch," said Coach Julie Clark. "We made adjustments at halftime and came within 5 points of catching up."

In their game with Bellville, Friday, it was close all the way. "We are so proud of our Lady Raiders. They played intense, determined basketball and did not fold under the pressure of a close game," remarked Coach Clark.

The freshman girls got off to a fast start as they jumped out an 8-3 lead. The second quarter saw the Brahmettes

ettes come up with a strong surge to hold the Rice girls to 4 points.

Third quarter the play was evenly matched and both teams toughened up on defense. At the end of the period, the score was tied at 16.

"I told my girls this was their game. All they had to do was beat down on defense, take their time on offense and run their plays," Clark commented. "They did all that, added the will to win, and pulled off a great victory."
