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Mattox, Krueger front-runners in senate race

The House Public Education Committee last week approved a school funding proposal that is basically the same as a measure blocked by Republicans in a pre-Christmas special session.

Panel chair Libby Lineberger, D-Manchaca, said the school funding package should be ready for the full House to consider this week.

GOP members have indicated they will not support the amendment unless accompanying legislation addresses some of their concerns. They want to make any tax increases subject

to voter approval and restrict court intervention in school funding.

House and Senate leaders say a proposed amendment may be approved by lawmakers by Feb. 20 to go on the May 1 ballot.

Mattox Strong: GOP Poll
U.S. Senator Bob Krueger finds himself in a familiar role: a moderate front-runner in a crowded field, surrounded by left- and right-wing candidates.

Because he is the hand-picked appointee of Gov. Ann Richards, Krueger is the symbolic front-runner. He's never claimed to have the lead.

In fact, Texas Republicans released new poll results showing former Attorney General Jim Mattox leading the field at 22%; Krueger, 18%; State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hut-

chison (GOP), 16%; GOP Congressmen Jack Fields, 9%; Joe Barton, 7% and Democrat Jose Angel Gutierrez, 3%.

A spokesman for Krueger said the poll shows that Texans remember Mattox because he lost his 1990 bid for governor.

The survey, conducted Feb. 1 by Public Opinion Strategies, polled 600 likely voters and had a margin of error of four percent.

Gay, Lesbian Issue
Krueger supports gays and lesbians in the military, but he urged President Bill Clinton to let generals decide how to implement the new policy.

Krueger considers this a reasonable appeal to the middle ground, but it irked leftist homosexual groups and rightist religious groups.

His opposition's strategy so far is obvious: first get Krueger to declare a position, then peel off layers of his support with criticism from all sides.

The Dominant Issue?
Mattox, although not yet an announced candidate, quickly reported strong support for homosexuals in the military. He knows that if you want groups to stand strongly behind you, then you must make a strong stand for them.

Republicans, of course, criticized Krueger for even thinking of letting homosexuals wear a military uniform.

The issue, rightly or wrongly, is fast becoming the focus of the Senate race, despite the fact that most Texans are probably more worried about the economy.

Homosexual Marriage Bill
Last week, Rep. Glen Maxey, D-Austin, and Rep. Debra Danburg, D-Houston, filed a bill to legalize homosexual marriages in Texas. Maxey is openly gay and Danburg represents the notorious Montrose district.

Maxey complained that despite cohabitation, joint credit cards and checking accounts, his companion would be powerless to give permission for Maxey's emergency room treatment.

Bipartisan House Seen
Signaling a more bipartisan Legislature, House Speaker Pete Laney last week revamped the House leadership

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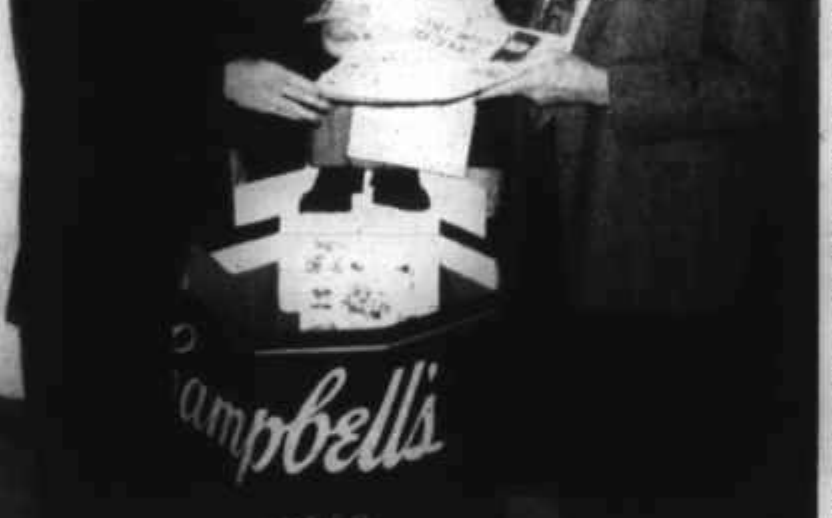
Hopefully with a lot of help from the community and money being re-
