Finally, citizens to vote on school funding amendment

Gov. Ann Richards got her revenge last week, running over a bloc of House Republicans who gridlocked her November special session on public school finance reform.

The governor's forces, mostly Democrats, stalled initially then twisted enough arms to get more than the 100 votes needed to put the controversial "Robin Hood" plan on the May 1 ballot.

But it's not state law yet. Voters will finally decide whether to approve the plan, so named because it would

Overshadow Senate Race?
 As it is, this single amendment threatens to overshadow the original thrust of the May 1 election, to fill the U.S. Senate seat vacated by Lloyd Bentsen.

Last week, Dallas entrepreneur Richard Fisher, a Democrat, announced his candidacy, outlining a platform based on reform and deficit reduction. Fisher was an advisor on foreign affairs to Ross Perot's presidential bid.

Meanwhile, former Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox edged closer to formally entering the race. This is something top Democrats supporting party designate Krueger had hoped to avoid.

House Judiciary Committee chairman Jack Brooks, D-Beaumont, said, "I wouldn't put it that way. I would recommend him because he is a highly competent lawyer... and they might find a spot for him if they had a place for him."

However, federal law prohibits promising employment in return for political support.

Mattox said, "It's a pretty sad commentary when you have congressmen up there trying to get the strong candidate out for a weak candidate. Some polls show Mattox leading Krueger."

Second House Vote Risky
 The Senate is expected to rubber stamp the House version this week. Though senators earlier adopted a much different version, few believe they could muster 100 votes again in the House.

Nabers' appointment to the Texas Railroad Commission with a 27-3 vote. Nabers, who is giving up a seat on the Texas Employment Commission, was sworn into office privately the next day, with a formal swearing in set for Feb. 24.

In a 30-0 vote, the Senate also confirmed Paul Williams to the State Board of Insurance. Williams, until recently, served as Gov. Richards' chief of staff.

The State Board of Insurance began hearings last week into a proposed double digit increase in the benchmark rate for automobile insurance. Farmers Insurance Group, the second largest auto insurer in Texas, recommended a 14.6% hike and USA proposed an 11% increase.

State Rep. Ben Campbell, R-Carrollton, was indicted by a federal grand jury on seven counts of conspiracy, bank fraud and making false entries on bank books. Campbell said he was innocent and that accusations had been made by a longtime political adversary.

Smart Jobs Bill Passed
 A bill creating a program to assist Texas businesses in training workers and provide financial incentives for businesses expanding in the state passed the House last week.

Gov. Ann Richards is expected to sign the bill this week. The program will be administered by the Texas Department of Commerce. "The Smart Jobs Fund Program will help businesses train and retain workers, building a world class work force second to none," said Commerce Executive Director Cathy Bonner.

The fund is created by diverting one tenth of one percent from the state Unemployment Insurance Tax. It is estimated that there will be approximately \$50 million per year in the fund.

Group to Manage Parks
 The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department announced an unprecedented contractual agreement to allow the nonprofit group Texas Rural Communities Inc. to assume management of five state parks facing budget cuts.

The parks are the Eisenhower Birthplace in Denison, Fort McKavett near Menard, Fort Lancaster near Ozona, Star Mansions in Marshall and Caddoan Mounds near Alto.

In recognition of their dedication, Rice school trustees were honored with a reception Monday, Feb. 8, prior to their regular meeting.

The School Board members of the Rice Consolidated Independent School District were also presented with certificates of appreciation for their dedication, leadership and service to the children of this community.

Rice CISD Supt. Carolyn McGaughey presented the certificates to board members during the regular meeting. The trustees include President Jim Wiese, Vice President Kate Labay, Secretary Melody Grigar, Jack Yawter, Sam Center, Reggie Briscoe and Frederick Leopold.

The trustees were recognized as a part of the National School Board Recognition Month in February.

Supt. McGaughey's office issued a statement on the special recognition for board members. Local board members are responsible citizens who carry out the trust form of representative government, that of volunteer public service. This service is the purest form of grassroots democratic principles on which our nation was founded.

H-GAC provides a forum for discussion of areawide concerns and promotes regional cooperation through comprehensive planning and numerous services to local governments in the counties of Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Walker, Waller and Wharton.
