A&M International University while Corpus Christi State University would be renamed Texas A&M at Corpus Christi.

State Comptroller Sharp... The second annual Earned Income Credit (EIC) public awareness effort was launched by Texas Comptroller John Sharp's office recently. A massive outreach campaign has been mounted to bring more than \$1 billion in federal tax credits home to Texas.

Following the proposals by his office to make \$4.5 billion additional revenue available during the next two year budget period, Sharp urged low and moderate income working families to give their local economies a further boost by filing for the federal income tax credits during the next few weeks. "At least 1.3 million working Texas families qualify for the Earned Income Credit this year, pumping more than \$1 billion into communities all across our state," Sharp noted. The little known EIC federal tax refund program returns money to working families who earned less than \$22,370 in 1992 and had a child living at home for at least six months of the year. Eligible families may receive up to \$2,211. Last year, the Texas EIC campaign helped over a million Texans to receive a total of \$1 billion in federal tax refunds.

The program will continue through the April 15 deadline for filing federal income tax returns. Those who think they may qualify for this refund should file for it. To get additional information about the refund or help in filing for it, contact the local Department of Human Services office.

The United Way in some cities is helping with the campaign as well as Central Power and Light Co. Information is also available from the Texas Employment Commission.

With these changes, we will be investing in prevention and in the healthy future of all our children. And we will, actually be saving money because for every dollar spent on immunizations, approximately \$14 dollars in health care expenses would be saved.

These proposals offer Texas the chance to take the national lead in health care reform, beginning logically with the children. It's a sound, sensible start, both morally and economically. If enacted, it will serve as a model for the federal immunization initiative recently proposed by President Clinton.

Until now, we've been on a collision course, running through the flashing yellow warning lights. It's time to heed the moral stop light, then proceed with a strategy to guarantee all our kids the health care they need. Otherwise, the inevitable crash will not be an accident, but the sad consequence of willful neglect.

Views On Dental Health

THE BEST WAY TO FLOSS

Both brushing and flossing are needed to help you remove the bacteria from your teeth and gums that causes tooth decay. Here are some pointers on flossing techniques. After you've given your teeth a good brushing, take about 18 inches of floss. Wrap the ends around your middle fingers to take up the slack. Then use your thumbs to guide the floss between and around your upper teeth. When you're ready to switch to the lower teeth, use your index fingers to guide the floss.

The floss should be held tightly to keep it taught. But you should use gentle motions once it's inserted between your teeth. Don't force it or pull down hard. You might injure your gums. Curve the floss around each tooth and under the gum line, moving it up and down to loosen food particles and other debris. Then pull the floss forward so you'll be starting fresh with the next tooth.

Take a close look at your teeth as you do this to see if there are any noticeable signs of decay. Your gums should not bleed if they do, it may mean you need dental treatment.
