North Lake Baptist missionary lessons for March

The theme for the March lessons is "The Church and Her Leaders."

The church is styled as the bride of Jesus Christ. It is a group of baptized believers working together toward one common cause. We are organized, under organism, life. Her early leaders are sometimes called shepherds, bishops, watchmen, also elders.

First Week: The qualifications of leaders. I Timothy 3:1-13. Qualifications mean special skills and training for specific duties. Being a leader does not mean being a boss. A minister must have the ability to lead, and lead by precept and example. Apostle Paul made it crystal clear to Timothy (3:1), "this is a true saying if

a man desire the office of bishop' ..."

God has always chosen men as leaders. A leader must not be a novice, untaught; he must know without a doubt that God has never called or commissioned a woman to "go ye therefore" at any time period, leading His people.

A leader must not be a money lover but a soul lover. God is an infinite and perfect Spirit that lives within the hearts of all true believers minds. We are made heirs according to the hope of eternal life. And hope is our anchor.

Second Week: The duties of leaders. I Peter 5:1-3. Duties are anything a person is supposed to do or is ordered to do. The Holy Spirit gives direct orders. A leader must first "take heed therefore unto himself and to all the flock over which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers. Be a pattern of good works. And feed my sheep. Feed my lamb which I purchased with my own blood," Jesus said. "My sheep know my voice."

God's word is spiritual vitamins for growing souls. Feed them sound doctrine, knowledge and understanding. God requires the leader to "study and learn of me" to be able to correctly preach and teach true doctrine that can be supported by the scriptures. God's word holds the final authority. If the leader is weak, the membership will be the same.

Third Week: The respect due leaders. I Timothy 5:17. Respect means to think highly of or to look up to. The Apostle Paul taught Timothy, "Let the elders that rule well be counted worthy of double honor especially they, the preachers, who labor and toil in the word and doctrine. A wise preacher or leader will create a thirst for knowledge. Being anointed by the power of the Holy Spirit, he will feed God's people God's word. Yes the leader is due respect because God has chosen and instructed him how to lead his people. And God is too wise and intelligent for a leader to take the responsibility to preach and teach from the power of his own limited mind. The nature of the Holy Spirit is to search the deepest and most profound truths of God and to

study to understand His purpose.

Fourth Week: The rewards for leaders. I Peter 5:4. Reward is something given in return for something done. This reward will come after the Rapture. Paul said there is a crown laid up for me, not only me but for all of them who love his appearance. This reward comes from enduring suffering for Christ's sake.

Life in Christ is an assurance of happiness and victory. The greater our suffering in this world, the greater our glory in the next world. Nothing is more beautiful than what the Bible says about God and our future relationship with Him. The reward for a leader is according to his faithfulness toward the Great Commission that was placed upon him; "teach them whatsoever I have commanded you" and "lo, I am with you." The Holy Spirit is the divine line and God's word is the divine law.

Seminars offer help with farm, ranch estate planning

Farmers and ranchers have been concerned about high taxes that erode their estates. To help take the bite out of this problem, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is offering several educational seminars.
A two day seminar is planned in three locations at three different times around the state. Farmers and ranchers can learn how to reduce taxable estates and new methods for passing their operations to the next generation without tax and administrative burdens.
The seminars are in Portland, May 13-14; Lubbock, May 20-21 and San Antonio, May 24-25. Each begins with a discussion on estate taxes, deductions, expenses and tax rates.
Basic planning devices will be explained in depth. Among these are wills, bypass trusts, gifts, disclaimers and property titles. Relating estate plans to income tax savings can be of even greater benefit than just thinking about an estate plan. Some income tax savings can be greater than estate tax savings for people with commercial farm and ranch businesses.
Estate planning tools for agriculture will be discussed such as dealing with corporations, partnerships and selling part of the business to heirs.
The second day is devoted to special estate tax rules for agriculture. These include farm land valuation, deferred estate tax payment rules, life insurance, flower bonds and other property.

Effect of Smoking and Drinking on Insulin

Diabetics usually are instructed to pay special attention to daily eating habits, over-the-counter medicines ingested, and the way they care for their feet, teeth, and skin. Researchers are learning more about the effects of smoking and drinking on blood sugar and insulin levels in persons with diabetes. Insulin is a protein produced by the pancreas (except in insulin dependent diabetics) to aid in the utilization of glucose (carbohydrate) by the body.

The effect of smoking on insulin was evaluated recently in 20 smokers and 20 nonsmokers by researchers at Stanford University. Results of the study were published in a recent issue of the medical journal *Lancet*. Researchers found that smokers tended to have higher levels of insulin circulating in their blood than did nonsmokers. However, there was more resistance to insulin-stimulated uptake of carbohydrates (glucose) in smokers than nonsmokers. Researchers speculated that this effect was due either to substances in cigarette smoke affecting insulin in some manner or that smoking caused changes in the blood that decreased glucose uptake and use by the cells.

The American Diabetes Association recommends that diabetics avoid alcohol-containing beverages and medicines. Always read the labels of nonprescription liquid medicines to determine if alcohol is present.

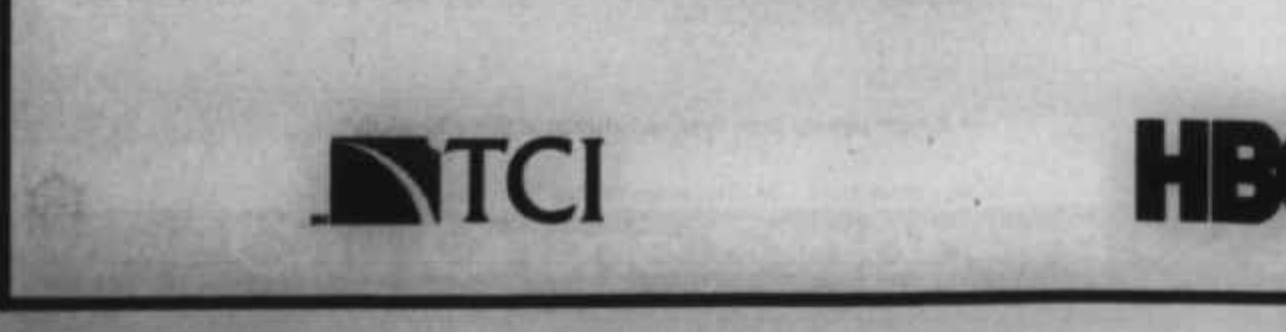
