Nurse's aide training offered at WCJC

A course for nurse's aide certification will begin May 17 at Wharton County Junior College Sugar Land campus. It lasts through Aug. 13.

The course will provide instruction in concepts and skills needed to provide basic patient care at any health facility. A student will be able to work as a nurse's aide or nursing assistant on completion of the course and be eligible for the state certification exam.

The 180 hour class will meet five days a week from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and costs \$550. Class enrollment is limited to 20 students and early registration is recommended.

Views On Dental Health

PROTECT YOUR BABY'S TEETH

People think of a newborn as having no teeth, but the 20 primary teeth that erupt in the next two-and-a-half years are already present in the baby's jawbones. At birth, the crowns of the primary teeth are almost complete. Usually the first four front teeth erupt through the gums first.

At this age, after every feeding, wipe teeth and gums with a damp washcloth or gauze pad to remove plaque. You can sit on a sofa with your child's head on your lap. Else place the child on the floor or dressing table. Be sure you can easily see into the mouth.

Brush and floss your child's teeth when all primary teeth have erupted at about age 2 to 2-1/2. Start dental visits at an early age to help your child build a lifetime of good dental habits. Control snacking because sugar-containing foods can cause damage of teeth through decay.
