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Wetlands topic for June meeting

A second wetlands meeting is scheduled for June 3 at the Brazos Bend State Park in Fort Bend County. The issue of wetlands identification and assessment is to be discussed.

The meeting is sponsored by the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB) in cooperation with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The Snake Creek Watershed had been selected by the TSSWCB, Coastal Plains Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD), USDA Soil Conservation Service and Texas Institute of Applied Environmental Research for the purpose of identifying, developing and demonstrating needs for using adequate wetland conservation efforts.

Some 50 landowners voiced concerns at a meeting in Feb. in Rosenberg over federal wetlands regulations. The June meeting will provide interested landowners assistance in restoring wetlands on their property.

More meetings are planned for landowners about wetlands and objectives of this project.

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RCISD staff hears top speaker, Wong

One of the most sought-after speakers in education today, Harry K. Wong, was the guest speaker recently for a full day staff development program hosted by Rice Consolidated School District. The day's theme was how to be a successful teacher.

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Highway improvements on Wharton meeting agenda

The meeting will cover proposed improvements to various highways in Colorado, Wharton and Matagorda Counties. The highway department will discuss what they consider is needed improvements.

The projects to be discussed are planned for construction within the next three years. Each year there will be an opportunity to update plans and move some projects forward or set them back on the schedule. Changes in design, funding or public feeling at the time can also be considered.

The Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 by Congress, requires TxDOT to plan three years ahead for highway improvements. The input about needs of the traveling public and area residents are invited at these meetings to better serve them.
