Clarence Henry Potter

August 20, 1905 — May 22, 1993

Clarence Henry Potter, 87, of Columbus died May 22, 1993, at Columbus Community Hospital.

He was born August 20, 1905, in Nada, the son of Joseph J. and Annie Schellmann Egger.

Potter and his family moved to Columbus in 1912 when his father assumed the office of Colorado County treasurer. He was united in marriage with Marjorie Eloise Hester on August 9, 1936, in Weimar.

In the 1920s, he was employed by Troxell Motor Company in the Stafford Opera House building as an auto parts salesman. He owned and operated Potter's Texaco Service Station from 1929 to 1952. He was a producer of Stafford Opera House dances from 1929 to 1935 and produced the Potter Kodoos in Columbus from 1942 to 1949.

He owned and operated Potter's Western Store from 1965 to 1973. After selling the store to his son Henry in 1973, he devoted himself to full-time cattle ranching until his death. He was an avid outdoorsman and enjoyed hunting.

Potter was a member of St. Anthony's Catholic Church, Knights of Columbus, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, life member of the Magnolia Homes Tour and charter member of Texas Trailriders Association. As a youth he was a member of the first Columbus Boy Scout Troop.

In 1973, he served as a director of the Columbus Sesquicentennial Trailride and took part in the Columbus Sesquicentennial Historical Pageant.

Potter was preceded in death by his parents; a sister, Albena Wendel; and three brothers, Ed, Lester and Jesse Potter.

Survivors include his wife of 57 years; a two sons and a daughter-in-law, Henry and Pamela Potter and Joe Potter, all of Columbus; a brother, R.F. "Bob" Potter of Columbus; three sisters, Honyetta Chamberlain of Arlington, Lucille Collins and Dorothy Chenault, both of Comroe; three grandchildren, Charles, Brian and Amanda Potter; and numerous nieces and nephews.

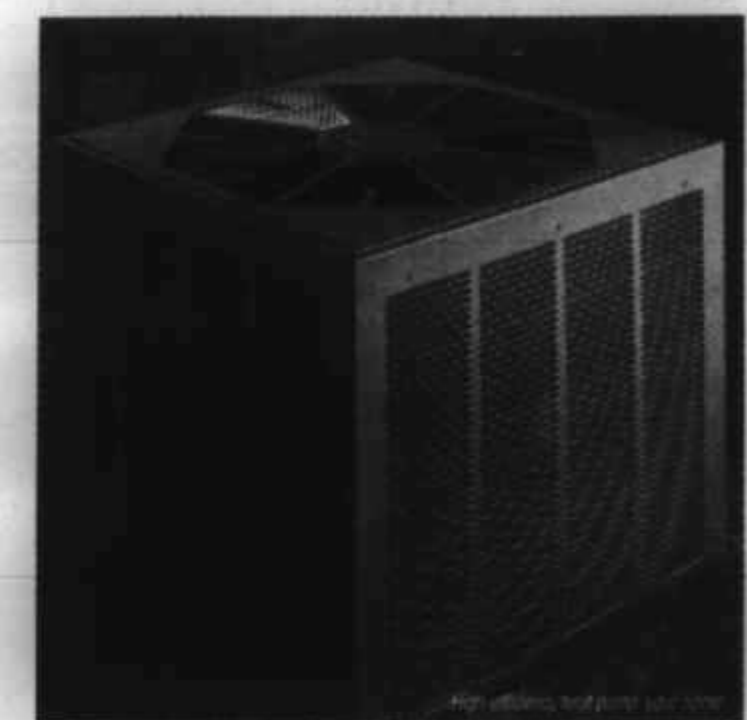
