This growing ethnic diversity in the population may require changes in the subjects taught from kindergarten through college. In six Texas cities—Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, El Paso, Laredo and Corpus Christi, Anglos already are in the minority. In many communities across the state, minority students outnumber Anglos in the public schools.

This trend is national. Among the nation's largest cities—those with more than 100,000 population—51 have populations in which minorities are the majority. These include Hispanics, African Americans, Asians and American Indians.

By 2025, demographers say there will no longer be any ethnic majority in Texas. According to the 1990 census, almost 40% of the state's population is made up of these minorities. While English is expected to remain

the dominant language, one in four Texans today speaks the tongue of their ethnic heritage at home. A decade earlier, only one in five spoke something other than English at home.

Spanish has always been the second "mother" tongue in Texas and is taught in most public schools and colleges. The Census Bureau reports that 3.4 million Texans speak nothing else at home. Surprisingly, 57,000 residents say they speak Vietnamese at home; 48,000 say Chinese is their home language; and 26,000 speak Korean at home.

Texans, who have never claimed to be linguists, had another surprise when they answered the census questions. From Indian dialects to German, 169 different languages were reported as being spoken by residents in their homes.

Will schools have to take another look at language instruction, world history and cultural heritage in planning curricula for the new century? It is a question that educators are asking as more foreigners arrive.

Some 130,000 newcomers arrive in Texas each year. 80,000 of them are foreigners. These immigrants alone will add nearly 5 million to the state's population by the year 2030.

Educating children of these new residents is a major concern to those responsible for the state budget. There are other problems, too. These newcomers have to be housed, assured jobs and medical care, and many other public services. For example, new highways will be necessary to handle the 1.5 million additional vehicles they will add to the present roads.

Dr. William Mobley, president of Texas A&M, is confident that education, as it has in the past, will provide the answers to whatever problems the new century will bring. "Education is the solution to the major problems of state and nation, such as crime, welfare, unemployment and an under-educated work force, in the emerging knowledge based society," he said.
