Beaumont rice field day to highlight cost saving

New technologies to reduce production costs for rice growers will highlight the 46th annual field day at Beaumont Research and Extension Center, July 14.

Bad weather and low prices have dealt southeastern rice growers a hard blow in 1993. At less than \$5 per hundredweight, the price of rice is the lowest in 40 years. A wet spring delayed planting and cool weather slowed crop development.

James Stancel, resident director at Beaumont, predicts yields will be cut by 15% or more. To cope with these times of adversity, the Beaumont Field Day will focus on lowering production costs.

Field tours will start at 8 a.m. Wednesday, July 14. Topics include minimum tillage for Texas rice growers; knifing in nitrogen and phosphorus; preplant, on rice; economic control of rice diseases, including sheath blight, blast and black sheath.

The 50th anniversary of the Texas Rice Improvement Association will also be noted and certificates presented to officers and staff for service.

The noon meal will feature barbecued beef and a rice dish.

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Views On Dental Health

PERIODONTAL PROBLEMS

You can move away from your mother-in-law, but periodontal disease may stay with you for life. Most people do not realize that periodontal (gum) disease is the major cause of tooth loss in adults. It is inflammation of the soft tissues surrounding teeth — the gums or gingivae — and can eventually destroy the bone surrounding the roots of the teeth. (Children are not immune; periodontal disease often begins in childhood.)

The major culprit appears to be plaque, a sticky, almost invisible film that builds up on the teeth. Plaque gets acidic and even more destructive after you eat sugar or starchy foods. Warning signs of possible periodontal problems:

- bleeding gums when you clean your teeth; bad breath; soft, swollen or tender gums; pus from the gum line on pressing; loose teeth; gums shrinking away from the teeth; any change in the way your teeth come together.

To protect, arrange for plaque removal by your dentist on a scheduled basis. Follow hygienic advice on brushing, flossing, rinsing, diet. Good oral hygiene is essential to protect against periodontal problems.
