Draft workers from WW II wanted for recognition

Any workers or volunteers who helped with the draft in the early 1940s are wanted by Uncle Sam. The Selective Service System wants to recognize all those workers as part of the commemoration of the agency's role in World War II.

As part of the many official observances for the 50th anniversary of World War II, the Selective Service will honor the ones who served on the home front during those crucial years.

This small federal agency ran the draft for WW II from October 1940 through the war's end.

The agency is now searching for men and women who had any official connection with it during that time but not the draftees themselves.

"Our search does not include the 10 million men who were drafted during the war. Their distinguished service is being commemorated by the military and veterans groups," Harold Doyle, state director of Selective Service of Texas, explains. "We're limiting our search to anybody still living who worked for the Selective Service System itself, either as a volunteer or employee."

The individuals wanted include volunteer board members, office workers, state directors, or reserve officers who served the agency in any official capacity.

Doyle commented that no records were kept showing who worked with the agency during the war.

The workers, when found, will be sent letters of appreciation, com-

memorative posters and Selective Service lapel pins.

They will also have the opportunity to share memories and contribute artifacts to the agency's growing historical collection.

Groups get LCRA donations

An employees group at the Lower Colorado River Authority has made donations totaling \$32,885 to 35 central Texas service organizations, including three in Colorado County.
