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What To Do About Dry Mouth

Dry mouth or xerostomia is a problem related to an inadequate production of saliva by the salivary glands. The condition can be caused by a number of medicines and radiation therapy, especially in the area of the head and neck. Dry mouth also can be caused by high blood pressure, cystic fibrosis, diabetes, malnutrition, and other disorders. With the loss of saliva, difficulties in eating, swallowing, or speaking may occur. Sleeping patterns may be affected. Chronic dry mouth may worsen dental caries or gum disease. Other potential problems resulting from the loss of saliva and dry mouth are constipation and bad breath.

Treatment of dry mouth involves the use of medicines that stimulate the flow of saliva or saliva substitutes that provide moisture to the mouth. If the salivary glands are still working, saliva stimulant medicines such as pilocarpine or bethanechol may be prescribed. According to a recent article in *Pharmacy Times*, isoproterenol has been shown to stimulate the flow of saliva in laboratory animals.

Commercial saliva substitutes are similar to saliva in thickness, taste, and mineral content. They do not contain enzymes found in saliva. These products are available as sprays, swabs, liquids, lozenges, gums, and gels. Saliva substitutes have been found to be more effective than simple mouth rinses or lozenges in relieving dry mouth.

Head Start is a child development program that provides education, medical, dental, nutritional and handicapped and social services for the children and families enrolled.

Parents are encouraged to become involved in all aspects of the program.

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N. Lake Baptist Church June Missionary lessons

The theme for the month of June was *Prayerful in Trouble*. Commune with God because this universe is in trouble.

First Week: Being prayerful in times of physical trouble. Isaiah 38.

Physical is a matter of illness of the body rather than the mind. When these calamities come upon us, Christians seek and trust God's guidance in dealing with these troubles. Upon the basis of Christian faith we believe the Triune God is able to change any physical condition if it is in His will.

Second Week: Being prayerful in times of national corruption. II Chronicles 7:14.

National corruption began when Nimrod, a black grandson of Noah, was the most outstanding leader in the 400 years between the Flood and Abraham. Genesis 8:10 states that the beginning of His kingdom was Babel.

God has always prefixed His business and His way is far past our finding out. Our heavenly Father knows everything that transpires in Man and in human history. The annual reunion of the Montgomery-Thatcher Historical Cemetery Association was June 26 at the parish hall of Christ Episcopal Church in Eagle Lake.

James S. Montgomery and his son-in-law, George Thatcher, were settlers in 1835 near the intersection of FM 102 and FM 950 about six miles south of Eagle Lake.

The great grandson of Sam Houston was one of the five special guests who attended along with 39 members. Sam Houston IV was the speaker for the event. He told of the sacrifices our ancestors endured to settle this land of Texas.

The speaker encouraged all Montgomery-Thatcher descendants to become members of the Sons or Daughters or Children of the Republic of Texas.

Houston also presented certificates of membership in the CRT to Robert Wells Crawford and Phillip Thatcher Crawford, and a certificate for SRT to Gary Barclay Cox.

A number of Montgomery-Thatcher descendants are members of the DRT as well as the Daughter of the American Revolution.

Members came from as far as Loudounville, New York and Colum-

bus, Ga., to the reunion.

After lunch the business meeting was presided over by President Col. Simon S. White Jr.

Members plan to complete restoration of the cemetery by their next meeting, June 25, 1994.
