## School board

Brown and Hoelscher have accepted positions in the Columbus Independent School District. Kovar will assume a teaching position in East Bernard and Ondrasek will join the Yoakum Independent School District. Contract were awarded to Yolanda Perez of Austin and Theresa Koster of Watertown, S.D., to teach bilingual education at Eagle Lake Primary School and Melanie Kallus to teach first grade in Sheridan.

A contract to teach summer school geometry was awarded to Jeanette Volkmer.

The board approved the purchase of two video cameras, a VCR, and silent boxes to be installed in the district's buses in order to monitor student behavior. Cameras and boxes were also approved for Rice High School and Eagle Lake Middle School. Principals will determine the areas in the building to be monitored.

The board approved a student insurance proposal that will cover all students in grades 7 through 12 participating in University Interscholastic League events, with some limitations, at a cost to the district of \$8,433.

Heretofore, only varsity football players were covered by district insurance. Male and female athletes, cheerleaders, band members and all UIL participants will come under the new policy.

An Alternative Education Program to be conducted at the Gulf Coast Christian Camp located on Farm-to-Market Road 102 was approved. RCISD will join the Weimar and Columbus school districts in the cooperative program. The program will target, but not be limited to, 40 students.

skidded 154 feet before coming into contact with the right front of the Ramirez station wagon.

Ramirez, who was apparently not wearing his seat belt, was ejected from his vehicle and was probably killed instantly on impact. His car appeared to have rolled on top of him according to the DPS trooper.

DPS officers found \$1,000 cash folded in Ramirez' pocket but were unable to locate a wallet to identify him. His wife, Patti Ramirez, later confirmed that he did not have his wallet. She said he only had his driver's license and identification with him leaving his wallet at home.

Glen Flora firefighters were the first on the scene. They found the body about 30 feet from where the station wagon eventually came to rest on the grass of the southbound lane. The front half of the car was mangled and the engine, which was torn out, ended up about 20 feet away under the truck trailer.

Insurance documents and other debris along with the windshield, were scattered along the side of the road.

The truck driver, Masson, gave a blood sample as required by law, to determine whether any alcohol was in his system. However, DPS officers said there was no indication that he was under the influence. Masson was uninjured and his truck received minor damage. The truck was empty at the time of the accident.

The truck was leased to Aggregate Haulers Inc. of Houston which operates 150 trucks taking loads from Garwood, Altair and Eagle Lake to Houston.

Masson told DPS officers that he was traveling about 50 miles per hour in a 55 mph zone when the station wagon pulled in front of him. The truck had just passed through a construction area on FM 3614 near FM

102 and had not resumed full speed according to Trooper Mejerado and Blunston.

Ramirez' father, Herbert Ramirez Sr., who works for the City of Eagle Lake, was notified and arrived at the accident scene.

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## 10 Receive sentences in District Court... Woods, Glover found guilty in Gindlers case

James "Ducky" Woods, 17, was sentenced to 15 years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ) recently after District Judge Gus Strauss found him guilty of arson as well as burglary.

Charges against Woods were filed following the Feb. 16 fire and burglary at Gindlers in Columbus.

Reginald Lee Glover, 19, also involved in the incident, was found guilty of burglary of a building and given five years probation and ordered to pay a \$1,000 fine along with \$1,555.65 in restitution.

Three others charged in the Gindlers blaze, Patrick Lanell Wright, 18, Derek D'Monte Sewell, 18, and John "BB" Soval, 19, will face the judge at a later date. Pre-trial investigations on these individuals are still in progress.
