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PRAIRIE EDGE MUSEUM NOTES

Prairie Edge Museum continues to be a place where signs of old businesses no longer existing here are displayed. One of the most recent additions is through the courtesy of Billy Stiles. The large signs were used to advertise Beckman's Drugstore which was an important business enterprise in mid-century Eagle Lake.

Our museum again proved to be an attractive site for local meetings when the members of the Colorado County Historical Commission met there the evening of July 15.

Local members hosted the meeting and were assisted by museum members Bill Harrison Sr. and Elizabeth Boothe.

After a covered dish meal and business session, the guest speaker, Robert M. Armstrong of Sugar Land, gave many highlights from his recently published book entitled *Sugar Land, Texas and the Imperial Sugar Company*. Mr. Armstrong was president of Imperial Sugar from 1962 until his retirement in 1972.

Much of the book's contents deal with Eagle Lake's economic history. An article by Rollin Baker in the July 22 issue of the *Headlight*, gives further information found in the book which can be ordered through Gifts of Distinction.

The Thrift Shop will be open again for regular business Saturday, Aug. 7, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. there are many good buys in children's clothes and jeans. There are also handbags, pictures, men's ties and costume jewelry.

The display cases representing nearby towns contain many interesting artifacts. One of the items is a photograph of the late Dr. R. Henry Harrison, father of W.H. Harrison Sr.

There is a very clear picture of the students and teachers of the Allegheny School in 1922. Students were in grades one through seven. Among the pupils was Bill Harrison. Another picture was made during the great 1913 flood when the overflow water from the Colorado River was 26 inches deep in most Allegheny homes.

Recent additions to the Nada display case are three plates through the courtesy of Kitty Janish and Elizabeth Schoellmann. Two of the plates advertised the Nada Grocery and Market, 1952-53 and 1953-54. A third plate has pictures of the three church buildings that have been on the site of the present church Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Pictures include the Nada Grocery Store which was an I.G.A. Store during the proprietorship of A.J. Lichnovsky and W.A. Braden.

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New Problems With Treating Tuberculosis

About a year ago officials at the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) reported a dramatic increase in the number of newly reported cases of tuberculosis (TB) in the United States. About 8 million people world wide are now infected with *Mycobacterium tuberculosis*, the bacteria that causes TB. Almost 3 million people die each year from this disease. A major concern of public health officials is the recent outbreak of infections that are resistant to standard TB medicines. A 1991 New York City survey indicated that one-third of all cases were resistant to one of the currently available TB medicines. Almost 20 percent were resistant to isoniazid and rifampin, two of the most effective TB medicines. In addition, many patients are becoming reinfected because drug treatments have not lasted long enough. A third problem has been an increase in the number of cases of TB that complicate the treatment of patients with AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome).

An approach to the continuing problem of drug resistance is to use five to six drugs in the patient until lab tests show which drugs have the most promise. Some physicians then recommend a minimum of three drugs given over a period of two years. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration is encouraging manufacturers to develop new drugs for TB by offering to speed up the approval of such medicines.
