Columbus FFA reflects on year gone by

The Columbus FFA Chapter has a long, rich history of competition and achievement. The group is innovative, using the newest materials and ideas available to get students involved.

Members compete in livestock, dairy, land, range and pasture, horses, mechanics, chapter conducting, skills creed, public speaking, computer and curriculum skills. They compete in the Houston, San Antonio and Colorado County stock shows along with those of other counties.

The chapter sponsors the Columbus FFA Show and Sale in early March. Over 85 animals were exhibited and \$85,000 brought in by last year's sale. It is completely organized and operated by chapter members with the help of the Alumni Association.

Seven members attended the Washington Conference Program this summer. The chapter also had representatives at the Corpus Christi State convention.

Bradi Jones is current District IV

vice president and will lead a workshop for District chapter officers. Gea Jones, past chapter president and District IV secretary, was approved for her American FFA Degree to be sent for national review.

Among awards received over the year:

- Eight members received state FFA degrees: Bradi Jones, Kevin Little, Eugene Kubicek, Curt Hahn, Eric Dvorak, Nathan Brown, Travis Kent and Chris Blaschke.
- Chapter given gold rating, first in Area III and fourth in State. It is given for overall excellence as a Chapter.
- Team earned first place in state curriculum contest, made up of Julie Miller, Melanie Frank and Lynn Koepke. Julie was also first high point individual with Melanie fifth and Lynn eighth.
- Team won third in state computer applications contest consisting of Bradi Jones, Charles Potter and Brian Potter.
- Team that placed 12th in state 102

contest was Kim Klein, Nicole Noska and Tara Hagendorf. This tested identification of animal breeds, tools and equipment.

•Golden Horizon Blue Award to the chapter of overall excellence to a Texas FFA chapter.

•Newspaper and radio activity award given to chapter by Texas FFA Alumni Association for strong public relations program.

•Gold Chapter for building our American Communities; Columbus chapter was state runner up in this community service award.

•Third place in state chapter safety award for participating in community safety programs.

The incoming Columbus FFA chapter officers are Bradi Jones and Kevin Little, team leaders; Cody

Swindall, community service chairman; Tara Hagendorf, Melanie Frank, Nicole Noska, Kim Klein and Lynn Koepke.

The chapter also sponsors a junior chapter with members from third through eighth grades. The junior members are allowed to show in the breeding shows at the Columbus FFA Show and Sale.

To become a member, the student's parents must be active members of the FFA Alumni.

The Alumni Association is the support organization for the chapter. They have over 80 members and support all phases of the chapter operation.

Preventing and Treating Insect Stings

According to different studies, up to four percent of the American population is allergic to the venom of one or more insects. Following the sting or bite of wasps, bees, ants, hornets and other insects, venom introduced into the blood can produce an anaphylactic response that can be life threatening in persons with insect allergies. Symptoms include swelling of body parts other than the area of the sting (e.g., lips and eyes), weakness, wheezing or coughing, severe itching, breathing difficulty, and unconsciousness.

Persons who are experiencing a serious allergic reaction should see a physician as soon as possible. An injection of epinephrine is one of the first therapies prescribed for persons with anaphylactic reactions. An injection of diphenhydramine also may be given. Mild reactions may respond adequately to an oral nonprescription antihistamine and a topical steroid cream such as hydrocortisone.

Venom desensitization may be recommended for persons with known insect allergies. A series of injections of venom-like materials protects the body against future contact with the venom of stinging and biting insects. Prevention also includes the avoidance of perfume or cologne, brightly-colored clothing, and scented cosmetics when staying outdoors during warm months.
