Water quality is issue for Wharton meeting

A town meeting has been scheduled for Aug. 19 in Wharton to hear from area residents about water quality issues.

The Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) is sponsoring the town meeting beginning at 7 p.m. in the Wharton Civic Center, 1924 N. Fulton.

This meeting is part of a state mandated program to conduct a detailed assessment of the Colorado River basin.

The LCRA is looking to area residents to assist in the effort by speaking out about issues that concern them.

The LCRA personnel want to know about existing or potential pollution problems, and the public's views on what pollution control programs are working, according to Ken Manning, manager of the LCRA Clean Colorado Project.

This is the third town meeting by the LCRA this year. Five others were held in 1992 including sessions in Columbus and Bay City.

As part of the fact gathering effort, the LCRA, Upper Colorado River Authority and the Colorado River Municipal Water District have established a 32 member steering committee.

The committee of representatives from local governments and other water quality experts is to help identify issues of concern throughout the watershed.

The steering committee will meet in Wharton Aug. 19-20 in conjunction with the public town meeting.

TxDOT scholarship assists A&I student

An engineering scholarship program begun last fall will benefit a Texas A&I student.

Victoria native Cheborah Kuykendall will finish her civil engineering degree at A&I with a grant funded by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

Through its Conditional Grant Program for engineering majors who are minorities, TxDOT has assisted four college and three high school students for 1993-94.

The conditional grant pays each recipient up to \$2,500 per semester with the amount dependent on the student's tuition, fees and verifiable financial need.

Last year, TxDOT awarded the grants to 38 college and high school students.

The condition for the program is students must agree to work for TxDOT for two years immediately after graduation or pay back the grant.

Students must also carry a minimum of 12 hours of coursework and maintain a 2.3 grade point average.

High school seniors and college students who are Texas residents and members of minority groups are eligible.

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Photoaging is a skin condition in which exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation such as from sunlight results in wrinkles, loss of skin elasticity, and an uneven skin color. The skin may become yellow and leathery. The effect of photoaging on skin is the same as with the normal aging process but often is much more severe and occurs more rapidly. Protection against UV rays of the sun begins by spending less time in direct sunlight. If extensive sun exposure cannot be avoided, wear protective clothing such as long sleeve shirts and wide-brimmed hats to prevent photoaging.

Another approach to prevention of photoaging is through the application of sunscreen products to the skin. According to a recent issue of Postgraduate Medicine, sunscreens offer the single most important method of protecting against harmful effects of the sun. Physical sunscreens such as zinc oxide reflect and scatter UV light as it reaches the skin. Zinc oxide cream may be messy to use and often it is washed off while swimming or sweating. Chemical sunscreens, such as para-aminobenzoic acid and the benzophenones, absorb UV radiation. The UV radiation absorbing ability of chemical sunscreens is expressed as an SPF value. Skin specialists typically recommend sunscreens that have an SPF value of 15 or higher.
