TCL changes service to meet FCC rules

Bill Berek Jr. with TCL Cablevision of Central Texas announced Sept. 1 that modifications to the cable service and rates have been made to comply with recently released government regulations.

"This is mostly good news for our customers," said Berek. "Depending on their situation, our customers will either receive the same programming for lower costs or more programming for the same costs."

Under the 1992 Cable Act, cable system rates and services were expected to reach certain benchmarks by Sept. 1, 1993.

TCL Cablevision has announced these changes to their services:

- Basic service at \$9.76 per month will include KPRC-2, KHTV-3, KTXA-4, KRVB-5, KTBC-7, KUHT-8, KXAN-9, KXLN-10, KHOU-11, KTRK-12.
- Expanded Basic service at \$11.71 per month will have Univision-13, CNBC-15, TNT Turner Network-16, ESPN-17, HSE-18, AMC-19, Family Channel-21, Nashville Network-23, CNN-24, USA-25, Weather Channel-26, WTBS-27.

There are a number of other services and special programming available at additional charges.

Fees will include a monthly equipment charge of \$88 for standard converter and 22¢ for remote control. Installation for an unrented home is \$32.36; restart or reconnect home installation is \$16.18; additional connections with installation are \$5.39 each; additional connections, separate installation, \$16.18 each; plus other fees for various specific services.

The cable company will add a \$3 charge to late payments and cable customers \$10 for any non-sufficient funds charges. Any unrented standard converter will cost \$75 and addressable converter \$150.

These service and rate changes are the latest in a series of moves cable companies are required to make under the 1992 Cable Act passed by Congress last Oct. The FCC is responsible for developing the regulations necessary to enact the law.

The FCC released the regulations on benchmark rates in May 1992 and gave cable companies a short time frame to understand the regulations—over 400 pages long—and meet the benchmarks. To allow the cable companies additional time to enact the regulations, FCC extended the deadline to Oct. 1, then backed it up to Sept. 1, 1993.

"Cable television is going through a revolution in technology and service," said Berek. "There are exciting new programming services and technologies being developed and we hope to bring some of that to our customers here in Eagle Lake soon."

With this ordinance in effect, it will no longer take a signed complaint from a property or business owner in order for law enforcement officers to request loiterer(s) to leave the premises or be arrested.

Council felt so strongly about the ordinance being a necessity in giving officers another tool to rid city streets of crime problems, that it deemed the ordinance an emergency measure, thus putting it into effect immediately on its adoption and publication as required by law.

A resounding applause filled the city council meeting room as the ordinance was adopted. Many of the citizens present at the meeting had voiced their opinion on the crime problem in Eagle Lake and felt it was time to join together to do something about it.

The Rev. Joe James and his grievance committee then addressed Council in regard to the growing "moral" problems in the city, including blocking streets, loud music, public drinking and cursing; problems they feel make it unsafe to travel in some areas of town.

James passed out a map depicting these areas and related incidences where citizens have been harassed as they traveled the streets.

He told Council that there are many problems in the City and all citizens and taxpayers are going to have to "turn this thing around together."

"We're pleading with you," said James. "Time has run out for us to have law and not enforce it. Our police need a little more authority to get it done, if parents don't get it done. We can't tolerate what is going on in this town."

The new ordinance may give law officers the authority to "get it done."

James and other citizens present agreed with the idea discussed by Council of a possible neighborhood patrol and watch program for Eagle Lake.

Council then awarded the bid for the street paving program to Demehl Construction in the amount of \$46,402.50.

Council members also adopted an ordinance setting the property tax rate. A tax rate of \$0.47245 per \$100 valuation was assessed in the current budget. City Manager Ron Holland reported that this year's figures from the Colorado County Central Appraisal District gives the rate of \$0.47180 as the maximum amount allowable without being subject to a rollback.

The ordinance lists the tax rate of \$0.47180, including \$0.361431 for the general fund and \$0.110369 for debt service.

After several months of discussion, the City also has a new trucking ordinance.

The ordinance states "no person shall operate a commercial vehicle on any city street except for the purpose of delivery, pick up or driving to and from repair facilities, or for the purpose of entering or exiting a private parking lot of a commercial establishment, for not more than the minimum distance necessary."

A person may operate a commercial vehicle on city streets to go to and from the place of residence provided they obtain a permit from the City that must be approved by the council with a permit fee of \$25.

The ordinance names Glen Flora Road, Beaks Avenue and State Street from Beaks Avenue to Milam Avenue as designated truck routes.

The ordinance continues to allow no parking of commercial vehicles on city streets.

A commercial vehicle is defined as "any single vehicle with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than 26,000 pounds, or any such vehicle towing a trailer with a gross vehicle weight rating of more than 10,000 pounds, which is self propelled and designed or used primarily for transportation of property, or any size vehicle which requires hazardous materials placards whether loaded or unloaded."

Council will grant permits on an individual basis.

It was RHS Parents' Night and the Raiders gave their families something to be proud of as they came from behind twice to snatch victory from the Van Vleck team.

David Godley led a fierce offensive machine gaining 315 yard in 24 carries. Derrick Jones rushed for 81 yards in 17 carries and Charyn Thomas took the ball 35 yards in nine carries.

"This was a great game for us. Our kids never gave up. The key for us tonight was the outstanding play of our linemen," said Head Coach Mark Johnson.

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Rice CISD budget decreases, taxes to increase

The Rice Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees conducted a public hearing on a proposed tax rate increase at a special meeting last Thursday night.

Several interested taxpayers and school personnel present heard Assistant Superintendent in Charge of Finance Fred Grahmann present figures showing the necessity for raising the tax rate. \$53688 per \$100 valuation to fund the \$8,210,253 1993-94 budget, even though this year's budget decreased by some \$300,000 compared to the 1992-93 budget.

Grahmann pointed out that the board adopted an \$8,410,896 budget at its last meeting, but that he had double entered a special education cop item in the amount of \$200,643 in his budget preparation. The amount had since been removed, thus the budget showed a new total.

The 1993-94 tax rate that will be considered for approval at a meeting Monday will be \$1.42170 per \$100 valuation, as compared to \$1.36802 in 1992-93. The rate includes \$1.25743 for maintenance and operation and 1.6427¢ for debt service.

Board President Jim Wiese told the group that the Board does not like to raise taxes, but "we all pay taxes, too."

Neil Boswick, representing the faculty and staff of Eagle Lake Middle School, told the Board his campus completely supported the board and the tax rate increase. He said he knew that the board had worked to cut the budget because teachers were performing many double duties this year.

Board Member Melody Grigar said, "...if we don't educate the child for today's society, we will pay for it somewhere later. Someone's going to get our tax dollar, either school or TIC."

When questioned about high administrative costs and non-mandated raises allowed in the new budget for administrators and other personnel, Trustee Reggie Brisco pointed out that taxpayers must remember that the Rice CISD operates five campuses as compared to surrounding districts, which causes higher administrative costs.

Administration costs, both instructional and general, along with curriculum and instructional staff (See School Board, Page 12)

Committee recommends 96-bed jail

The Colorado County Commissioners' Court finally completed the first step toward building a new county jail last Friday when it approved a recommendation by the Jail Advisory Committee to seek certification of obligation to fund the project.

The decision came after some 67 days of consideration, during which the committee held weekly meetings in regard to the problems with the current facility.

Late last year, the Texas Commission on Jail Standards issued a citation of non-compliance to county officials since it felt overcrowding was a major problem in the present facility. The standards set forth to meet regulations would allow only 15 prisoners to stay in the jail at a time. The problem with that is the high inmate population in the county.

Presently, the county has tripled its yearly budgeted monies for housing prisoners in neighboring counties with four more months left in the fiscal year. The county is spending \$13,000 to \$15,000 per month to house inmates elsewhere.

The committee addressed the court last week and made five basic (See Commissioners, Page 6)
