kick was good to put the score at 12-7. In the second quarter, Rice put more points on the board with 8:32 showing on the clock. Jones carried the ball two yards into the end zone making the score 18-7.

Just two minutes later, Van Vleck came back with a touchdown on a one yard run by Mangum. The Leopards' Bree made the two point conversion for an 18-15 score with 6:45 left in the first half. The Leopards went ahead less than two minutes later on a 13 yard run by Urk. Although Rice blocked the extra point kick attempt, the score rolled over to Van Vleck at 18-21 going into halftime.

As the game went into the third quarter with 10:49 showing on the clock, The Leopards' Bree made a 76 yard run coupled with an extra point kick by Breazeale to put the score at 18-28.

The Raiders came right back with a 72 yard run by Godley to make the score 24-28.

Rice continued its comeback as Godley made a nine yard touchdown run and moved the Raiders ahead once more, 30-28.

It was a short lived lead as the Leopards scored again with 1:33 left in the quarter on a two yard run by Griggs. His two point conversion put Van Vleck on top with 30-36.

Less than a minute into the final period, Jones took the ball over the goal line for Rice on a four yard run to tie the game. The fourth quarter belonged to the Raiders.

Godley put Rice in the lead with

1:05 left on the clock when he took the ball over for a four yard touchdown run and moved the score to 42-36. Rodney Gustus put the finishing touch on the score when he intercepted Van Vleck's final effort and carried the ball 32 yards to score the last touchdown and end the game with a 48-36 victory.

Leading the defensive effort was Ernest Sims who intercepted a Leopard touchdown and made a touchdown saving tackle on a long Van Vleck run. Larry Henderson caused and recovered a Leopard fumble on the Raider goal line immediately following Sims' effort. Henderson also led the Raiders with 14 tackles and four as-

sists. Defensive standouts included Brandon Wiese, Fernando Garcia, Jerome Haynes and Marcus Dogins. Contributing to the offensive effort were Sam Mader, John Kaluza, Greg Garcia, Gabe Garza, Ceasar Builrago, Antrone Clark and Heath Mahalic.

"We had a great effort from our entire team. We need to build on this effort this week as we will play a good football team this Friday," Coach Johnson remarked.

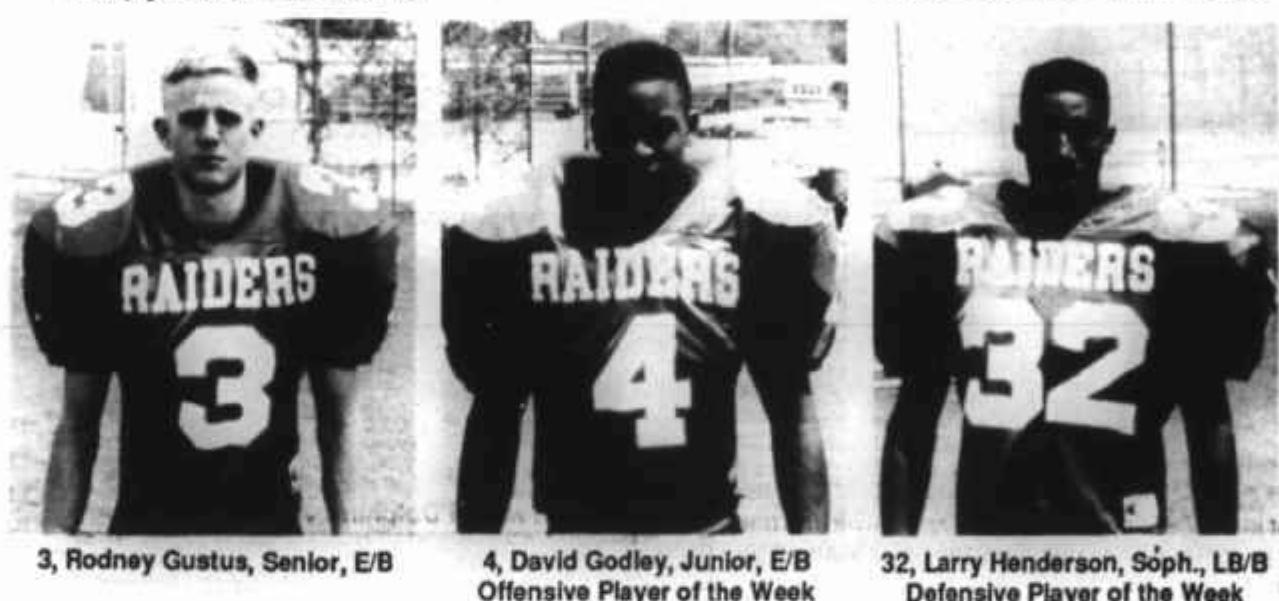
The Raiders will host Schulenburg this Friday, Sept. 10 at 8 p.m.
