Raiders drop to 2-1 with first loss

After drop to back victories in their opening of the 1993 football season, the Rice varsity suffered their first loss Friday night at the hands of the Weimar wildcats.

The host Wildcats win of 39-6 left the Raiders shaken but not destroyed as they prepare for district play at home this week against Bellville. Rice played hard during the first

half of the ballgame, holding the Weimar team to 14 points. Fernando Garcia led the Rice defense.

Senior Ernest Sims put the only Raider points on the scoreboard Friday night with an 87 yard kickoff return halfway through the second quarter.

The second half belonged to the Wildcats as they stopped the Raider offense cold. During the third quarter the host team added six points to the score. Weimar managed to rack up 19 more points in the final period to end the game 39-6.

Derrick Jones led the Raider offense with 32 yards in five carries, followed by David Godley with 22 yards in nine carries and Charlyan

Thomas with eight carries for 21 yards.

Antrone Clark caught all four of Thomas' completed passes for 50 yards.

As the Raiders prepare to begin district play, Head Coach Mark Johnson feels optimistic.

"I like being 2-1 going into district. It's a lot better than being 0-3. I'd rather our team had a lull last week than this coming week. This will be the one that counts." This is the Raiders' best record in 12 years at the start of district action.

Friday, Sept. 24, The Rice Raiders host Bellville at 7:30 p.m. All the Raider boosters are encouraged to come support the team.

two and a fumble recovery; Marvin Garza with two; Weishuhn with two; Hadac with two; Riddle with one tackle and a fumble recovery. Sunderman, Joey Sommerlatte, Cliff Cerny and Johnny Slavinski all had tackles.

"The kids showed improvement on all aspects of the game," commented Coach Jackson. "Let's keep working to improve."

In eighth grade action, the Lamar Ponies came to Rice and carried off the victory 14-8.

The white team looked vastly improved from the first game. Offensively the Rice boys were a lot better. Leading the Rice boys were offensive linemen Joe Navarro, John Pope, Monte Peck, Martin Ruvalcaba and Rafael Herrera.

Brian Stovall had eight carries for 36 yards and one touchdown; Sean Dulany, 14 carries for 37 yards, one extra point run; Clint McMillian, one pass reception from Jarmarcus Brooks for 15 yards; Brooks had a punt fake of 30 yards and a kick off return.

The Rice girls had a balanced scoring attack from Fields, Syretta Johnson, Hollie Shindler, LaToya Parker, Bedford and Amalie Kucharka.
