Historical Committee meet in New Bielau

Approximately 83 members and guests of the Colorado County Historical Commission met Sept. 16 at the New Bielau Community Center.

Chairman Doris Albright presided at the business meeting. Courthouse brick walk chairman Randa Simmons reported the deadline is Sept. 1993 for purchasing inscribed bricks for \$50 each. These bricks will be placed in

the north side courthouse walk. Colleen Willrodt, chairman for the Stephen F. Austin Bicentennial, said all schools in the county with Texas history classes have been asked to commemorate in some way in their classrooms, the Nov. 3 anniversary of Stephen F. Austin's birth. A list of suggested activities has been sent to each school.

Committee member Mildred Cambell has made arrangements for Joe Tom Davis, professor of history at Wharton County Junior College and author of a series of books about Texas' history, to be guest speaker for students at Columbus High School. Supe. Clor and Davis will set a date.

On Nov. 11, Davis will give a presentation to the Delta Kappa

Gamma chapter honorary education society of educators from Colorado Fayette and Bastrop counties. These social science teachers can go back to their classrooms and directly benefit some 10 to 12 thousand students.

Billie Osuna Kusey gave the meeting program on Czech settlers coming to Colorado and Fayette counties. She told of immigration from Czechoslovakia beginning in the latter 19th century. Land was plentiful and inexpensive in Texas; the climate was favorable; and water was available. Immigration to America was thought to be the only escape from police state suppression. Economic factors added to the immigration as discontented Central Europeans saw America as their opportunity to start over, she explained.

Special guests for the evening included the Fayette County Historical Commission, Carolyn Meiner, vice president and newsletter editor of the Czech Heritage Society of Texas was also present. Fayette County Judge Ed Janicka encouraged everyone to recognize the importance of writing their individual life history including incidental happenings as well as major events.

The Nov. meeting will be held in Frelsburg. Members will be notified.

Miller, FACR radiation oncologist; and Dr. Bali Netaji, oncologist and medical director of the Gulf Coast Medical Center's Regional Cancer Center will present program. Pensick. The task force, established by the STMC and GCMC, goes to rural communities to improve early detection of this cancer by informing the women of the area what they can do. Dr. Midez joins Eagle Lake Community Hospital staff

The Eagle Lake Community Hospital has announced the opening of a hospital based rural health clinic in Sealy. Internal medicine specialist Jaime Midez, M.D., will serve the clinic.

Dr. Midez recently completed an internal medicine residency at the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

Originally from Santiago, Chile, Dr. Midez moved to Texas seven years ago to continue his medical profession in a country with greater personal freedom. His wife, Lupita, has a background in interior design.

The Sealy Clinic will be open Monday through Friday offering the full time service of Dr. Midez who sees patients ages 14 and up for primary care. The clinic will have the services of Drs. Russell Thomas and John Lane a half day a week for obstetric and pediatric care. Physician Assistant Lois Goodwin also works in Sealy parttime.

The hospital opened the clinic to better serve the Sealy area which is classified as a medically underserved area. Without a hospital for the past six years, Sealy has been unable to attract new physicians. Eagle Lake Community Hospital hopes the expanded service area will mean an increased use of the hospital's services.
