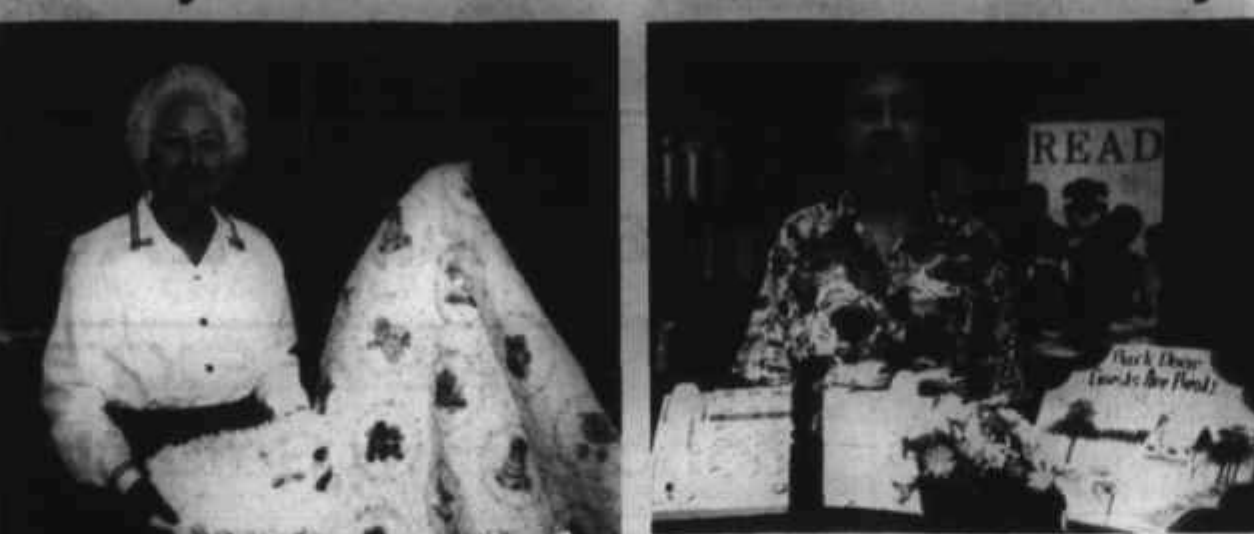

Raiders take last-second win

"It ain't over 'til it's over." No one knows the truth of the old adage better than the Raiders who stripped a victory from the jaws of the Smithville Tigers Friday in the final seconds of the ballgame.

Raider fans who braved the long drive to Smithville were rewarded with a 25-13 win that people will talk about for years to come.

Behind by 13 to 12 with only 16 seconds left to play, the Raider offense, led by Charyan Thomas and Antrone Clark, attacked the Tiger defense to add 13 points for their first district win of the year. Rice now has a 1-1 district record.

Thomas completed four of his 10 pass attempts for 90 yards with Clark catching all four. One was on a fourth down that set up the winning score. Clark snatched the winning touchdown pass in the back of the end zone, leaving above the Tiger defense.

David Godley was leading rusher for Rice with 14 carries for 114 of the Raider's 205 total rushing yards.

Ernest Sims gained 145 yards total offense, including a 51-yard kick off return to initiate the winning drive.

After their opening touchdown drive, the Tigers were held to practically nothing by a tenacious Raider defense. Rice showed its best defensive effort in years, as they held Smithville to 11 first downs and 96 yards rushing.

Smithville scored first with an 11-yard run by Sergio Garcia with 5:47

Colorado County's public defender resigns

Colorado County Public Defender Joe C. Fling tendered his resignation to the County Commissioners Wednesday, Sept. 29. He had served over

six years with the county. Fling had represented most of the juveniles and adults, 900 persons, charged with crimes in district and county courts during his tenure.

Fling commented that when the Texas Legislature created the office of public defender in 1987 there were only four public defenders in the state. It was a bold, innovative move for a rural county at that time.

Budget constraints over the past few years and other priorities such as

undercover drug work and a new jail have not allowed the office to keep up with staff, resource and equipment needs he noted.

Fling plans to continue his private law practice in Eagle Lake, including criminal defense.

County gets first 'dry' hydrant

The first dry hydrant has been installed in Colorado County. Clara Horndt with the Colorado County Soil and Water Conservation District (CCSWD) reports the new fire fighting help is located at a pond in the New Bielau community about a mile and a half south of FM 2434 and FM 155 on County Road 230.

A dry hydrant is a non-pressurized pipe system that is installed in the

bottom of a permanent body of water, such as a pond, lake or perennial stream. Fire department pumps can draft water directly from the hydrant to fight fires in rural areas where regular water systems and hydrants are not available.

The installation of a dry hydrant in private water on private land, does not make it "public water." The water use still belongs to the landowner.

The county commissioners agreed to provide the equipment and labor to install the dry hydrant. But the extra pipe and equipment to access the site must be purchased by the one request-

ing a dry hydrant installation. All nine fire departments in the county have endorsed the plan for the hydrants and the Texas Forest Service is funding one complete hydrant for each of the nine departments.

This first hydrant, purchased by New Bielau as a community project, was installed Oct. 1 in a pond owned by Sammy Barr.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Johnny Elstner and county employees, with CCSW personnel, CCSWCD directors and members of the New Bielau community were on hand to assist with the installation.
