Raiders continue roller coaster season

The Rice Raiders continued their roller-coaster season with a 29-12 loss Friday in Hallettsville. Throughout the game the Raider fans held tight to the hope of a last minute victory, but it was not to be.
The Rice offense fell victim to a tough Brahma defense which allowed the Raiders to attain the end zone only twice during the game.
The first Rice touchdown was made when Charlyan Thomas took the ball over the goal line late in the first half on a quarterback sneak.
Ernest Sims made the other points for Rice after setting up the drive with a 21 yard run. He finished it with a 4 yard pass into the end zone.
The Raiders fell short on their opportunities to score late in the game as the Brahmas worked toward a homecoming victory.
Fernando Garcia proved to be the most consistent player for the Rice defense with 13 tackles and three assists. Shawn McClain blocked two Hallettsville extra point attempts. He also caused two Brahma fumbles, one of which was recovered by Jerome Haynes.
Brandon Wiece contributed with a pass interception in the second half.
The loss gives Rice a 1-2 record in district play and 3-2 season record. Rice will host Sealy this Friday for the homecoming game.
The Friday night festivities begin at 7 p.m. with the crowning of the Rice High School homecoming queen followed by game kickoff at 7:30. Everyone is encouraged to attend and cheer the Raiders to a homecoming victory.

"We came up against a very good team and were not up to the test," commented Coach Jackson. "Our kids need to be able to compete for a whole game. We hope to learn not to give up when we get down a little bit."
