## Physician Assistants celebrate their month

October is National Physician Assistant Month and thousands around the country, including members of the Wharton Chapter of the American Academy of Physician

Assistants (AAPA), celebrated National Physician Assistant Day, Oct. 6. That day in 1967 three former medical corpsmen, who wanted to transfer the skills they had learned in their military service to a civilian profession, graduated from the first PA program at Duke University.

AAPA chapters around the country celebrated National Physician Assistant Day by hosting special activities in their communities. There are over 25,000 PAs in the U.S. who perform an essential role to health care. PAs are not independent practitioners though. They practice medicine with supervision by licensed physicians.

Approximately 70% of all physician assistants work in public and private clinics, for HMOs, and medical offices. Approximately 30% work in hospitals. PAs also serve as commissioned officers in all branches of the military and were cited for their contributions during Desert Storm. To become a physician assistant, an individual must graduate from one of the 37 accredited programs in the U.S. A typical program runs 102 weeks, compared to 153 weeks for a medical student. Most states also require PAs to pass a national board examination before they can practice medicine. Physician assistants are required to accumulate 100 continuing medical education credits every two years and, to maintain certification, retake the certifying exam every six years.

GINGIVITIS CAN BE CORRECTED

Gingivitis is an inflammation of the gums. It can be acute or chronic. Local causes are mouth infection, plaque, unremoved tartar (calculus) around the teeth, faulty dental work, poor bite and even unhealthy mouth breathing. Poor oral hygiene produces a high incidence of this infection. Symptoms: gums are inflamed in a band at the neck of the teeth; they are swollen, red or purple and bleed at the slightest touch. Pockets in the gums (a separation of the gum from the teeth) in which bacteria gather and multiply are formed from an accumulation of tartar. There could be pus or film coming from under the gum line when the gum is pressed. Unpleasant breath and a bad taste are common. Your dentist treats local gingivitis by removing the tartar. Any decay that has already occurred can be alleviated. Only regular visits to your dentist can save your teeth and gums through removal of tartar and prescribed oral hygiene programs.
