Also reported was the information that the pencil and pen machines are now in operation supervised by Olivia Maxie. All money generated from this source will go into the PTO fund.

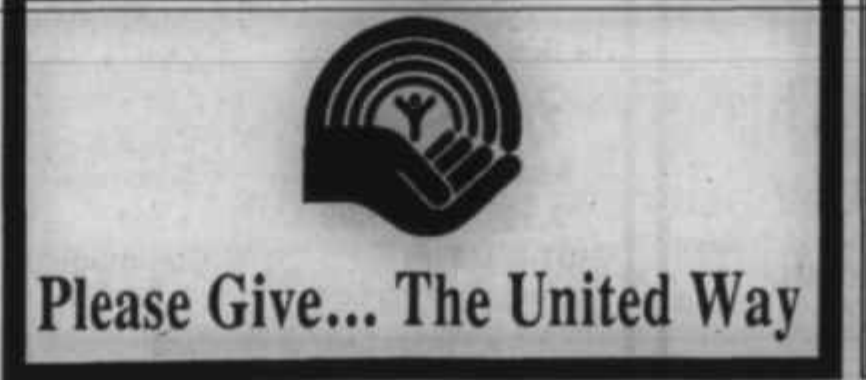

DO'S AND DON'T'S OF POWDERS AND POTIONS
Store shelves are filled with products pitched at your feet. A few of them may offer your feet some well-deserved pampering, but others should be given the boot. Foot powders applied to clean, dry feet can feel good and help absorb moisture, but avoid any such products that list starch as an ingredient. A moisturizing cream may help alleviate dry skin, which can be a perfect breeding ground for fungi and bacteria. Petroleum-based products should not be used for this purpose, however, as they don't allow the feet to breathe. Any preparation with alcohol should also be avoided for dry skin, since alcohol can cause additional drying. Too much of any product can send feet squishing and sliding along in socks and shoes. Everyone's skin and feet are different. Find the products that are right for you and stick to them.
