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Pressure Sores Common in Bedridden

Pressure sores, also known as bedsores or decubitus ulcers, are common in persons who are bedridden for long periods of time. Between 8 and 13 percent of hospital and nursing home patients experience problems with pressure sores. According to a recent issue of *American Family Physician*, the most important factors to consider in the prevention of pressure sores are the degree of patient mobility, skin moisture, personal activity, nutritional status, sensory perception in the skin, and friction placed on the body. These and other findings have prompted nursing personnel to establish preventative measures. One measure is the rotation or repositioning of bedridden patients every two hours.

Treatment of pressure sores may require removal of dead skin tissue. This may be accomplished through the use of *collagenase*, an enzyme that has been shown to be superior to other enzyme preparations for this purpose. Cleansers and disinfectants are used to clean the affected areas. Topical antibiotics such as *bacitracin* or *gentamicin* may be used. Air mattresses and air-fluidized beds aid sore healing by distributing body pressure more equally. *Vitamin C* and *zinc* supplements are used in some treatment programs. If the sore produces infection inside the body, treatment with oral antibiotics may be required.
