## Raiders wrap up Sealy, Hempstead

The Rice Raiders wrapped up another win Tuesday, Feb. 1, beating Sealy 81-63 in district basketball play. They followed up with a 99-84 victory at Hempstead Feb. 4. They now have a 9-1 district record.

The Raiders varsity opened the court action with a strong, steady scoring style. By the half they had filled the basket for a 42-15 lead. The Rice team slacked off slightly in the third quarter getting only 16 points

while allowing Sealy to make 70 points. But they picked up to close the game way out in front.

The Lead point getters were Darin Barrow with 17, Louis Barrow with 14, Brad Gohlke and Antrone Clark with 9 each. Sam Mader put in 8 points, Jerome Haynes made 7, Ernest Sims got 6, Jason Brunner got 5, Brandon Mathis made 4 and Chris Clemons had 2. Coach Ray Reynolds gave all his players some time in the

game. The next competition in Hempstead Feb. 4, was another win for the Raiders as they stayed out in front through the entire game.

The first half was a very even match between the two teams with the Raiders managing to pull one point ahead at the first quarter, 27-26, and another point at the second, 27-26, for a very slight lead. Hempstead seemed to slow down after the break and the

Raiders surged ahead with another 24 points and capped it off with 21 in the last period for the 99 winning score.

Clark was lead scorer with 23 points, followed by Mathis with 21, Mader with 16 and Haynes with 10. Adding to the total were L. Barrow with 8, Sims and Gohlke with 6 each, D. Barrow with 4, Brunner, 3, and Myron Howard with 2.

The La Grange game at Rice on Tuesday, Feb. 8, was also to be Parents Night. Friday, Feb. 11, the Raiders take on the Columbus Cardinals. Next week will be the last of the regular season. The Raiders go to Bellville Tuesday, Feb. 15, then host Smithville for the final on Friday, Feb. 18.

Josh Godley scored 10 points, Pete Rangel made 9, Kevin Godley got 8, Luke Coxwell made 4 and Jeremy Gohlke got 3.

The second win was over Hallettsville, 39-29 with J. Godley again leading the scoring with 18 points. Charly LeBoeuf put in 8, Gohlke added 6, Coxwell made 4, K. Godley got 2 and Rangel added 1.

PLAQUE, TARTAR — THE DIFFERENCE

Many people confuse the terms plaque and tartar, often using them interchangeably. In point of fact, they are very different.

Plaque is the sticky, almost invisible film of bacteria that forms on and between your teeth. Normal brushing helps to remove some of it. But no matter how well you brush, chances are some plaque will remain on your teeth. Where plaque accumulates, tartar often follows. They go together like the proverbial "horse and carriage."

The remaining plaque hardens or "calcifies" on your teeth, the result is tartar (also called "calculus"). It's a hard, crusty, cream-colored substance that forms unsightly deposits above the gumline, often on the lower front teeth. This is the major culprit in the formation of periodontal disease.

Once tartar has formed, no amount of brushing can remove it from your teeth. Only a thorough prophylaxis (cleaning and scaling) performed by your dentist or hygienist can do the job.
