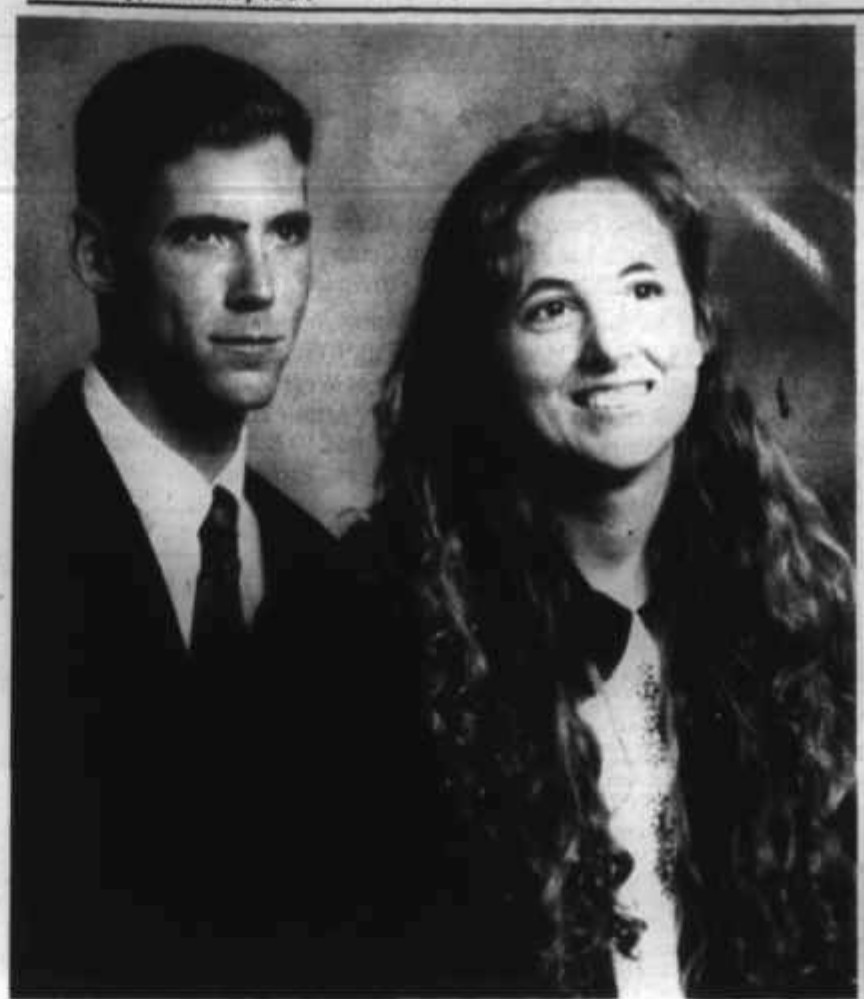
Sheridan News

CENTRAL CORE CALLUSES

A common callus is simply a thickening of the skin brought on by friction or pressure. When a callus forms a hard inner core, however, it is known as a central core callus, and the result can be extremely painful. These calluses generally form on the center, weight-bearing part of the foot's sole. Their root-hatched centers are composed of dead tissue that can spread into the foot's sweat glands. Central core calluses almost always require professional care to resolve. The usual home remedies for calluses, such as simple soaks or padding, tend to have little effect. Medication applied to the callus area can reduce the swelling, but the core itself may require surgical removal.

Early detection and professional attention to a foot problem offer a patient the best chance to complete health. Untreated foot problems can immobilize a person and discourage regular activity. Views On Dental Health

REDUCING DENTAL FEES

Like everything else in this universe, it costs money to have dental care. It's a fact of life, but unfortunately, too many people resist having, or worse prevent their children from having regular dental check-ups because it will usually be followed by a bill. Actually, this thinking is the opposite of reality.

The best way to keep your dental costs under control is to visit the dentist regularly for routine examinations and cleanings. Any problems you might have can be treated in their early, less complicated and preventable stages. If you wait until you have an emergency, very likely the problem is already serious, and treatment will be much more complex and expensive.

A good example is the patient who never goes to the dentist until it hurts. Usually the only options are to extract the tooth or save it with a root canal and crown which can cost as much as \$700 to save one tooth. If the decay could have been detected and filled before it hurt, a filling would have cost around \$40. So don't wait until it hurts to see your dentist!

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Hemorrhoids: Drug/Nondrug Treatment

According to Medical Times magazine, hemorrhoids (also known as piles) occur at one time or another in more than half of all adults. With hemorrhoids, the blood vessels and supporting tissues in and near the rectum become enlarged. Hemorrhoids may occur inside the rectum or outside the rectum. Enlargement of rectal tissue results from an increase in pressure to blood vessels in the rectal area. Pressure to the blood vessels often occurs with straining to eliminate hard stools.

Nondrug treatment of hemorrhoids involves warm sitz baths (sitting in a warm, soothing solution), getting regular exercise to relieve pressure to the affected blood vessels, and eating a high-fiber diet to make easier the passage of stools.

Nonprescription hemorrhoid medicines contain vastly different ingredients. The Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs offers these suggestions:

- use hemorrhoid products after bowel movements,
- products designed for external use should not be inserted into the rectum,
- products used externally should be applied sparingly,
- products containing resorcinol should not be used on an open wound anywhere, and
- if pain occurs with use of any product, consult a physician.
