Right-handed pitcher Aaron Machac went the distance on the mound, allowing only four hits. He struck out seven, allowed only one base on balls and gave up just one earned run.

The game ended with seven innings due to the 10 run rule.

The Rookies attacked the A's offensively with 18 hits.

Matt Faldyn led the hitters with a homer, two doubles and a single. The Sims brothers, Cary and Ernest, had three hits each. Ernest had a pair of doubles and a single while Cary got three singles.

Bo Bo Botard ripped a pair of doubles and Machac helped with a two singles. Tweet Ford, Shane Laake, Troy Roensch and Darrell Quimney each had one hit.

Ford made the defensive play of the game by reaching over the fence in deep left field to catch a long foul. He then threw a single to third base to nail the runner trying to advance on the play, completing the double play and ending the inning.

BUNIONS: ONE, TWO THREE

There's not much nice to say about bunions. They are ugly, causing a deformed appearance with the base joint of the big toe jutting away from the foot. They are painful, often accompanied by swelling. Unfortunately, bunions are also fairly common, especially in the aging foot. There are three basic types: 1) positional, a bony growth on the side of the big toe joint; 2) mild structural, in which the base of the big toe shifts outward; and 3) severe structural, in which the big toe bows out so severely that the second and third toes buckle in. Foot socks and a change of shoes can ease discomfort, but since bunions are structural in nature, surgery may be necessary to correct the underlying problem.

New surgical techniques make bunion eradication easier and faster, and recovery is even quite a bit more comfortable than just a few years ago. If you are one of the unfortunate victims of bunion pain, consider professional help. Our techniques are up-to-date, with three basic goals: to relieve pain, restore function, and improve appearance. P.S. Although bunions are often hereditary, they can also be caused by inflammatory conditions such as gout and arthritis.

WHEN HOSPITAL TREATMENT NEEDED

Most dental patients receive all of their dental care during their lifetime in their friendly dentist's chair. However, there are circumstances when hospital dental care is indicated.

Obviously, if you are involved in a serious accident that involves facial injuries (including the jaw or teeth), the dental work will be performed in the hospital. Also, there are less traumatic situations where dental treatment may be performed in the hospital.

If a patient has advanced dental disease, a more concerted effort to salvage some dentition can be made in the hospital. Patients who have a medical condition that puts them at risk can also be treated in the hospital in one session with the use of general anesthesia as can some children with serious dental disease or psychological disabilities.
